TAXPAYERS, PATRONS, RESIDENTS OF MANHEIM CENTRAL SCHOOL DISTRICT.

We in Lower Rapho Township have been contacting the Manheim Central School Board to delay the building of a two hundred thousand dollar (\$200,000.00) school east of Mount Joy Borough and near Salunga. Our area of Lower Rapho extends almost to the Marietta and Lancaster Pike below Marietta and includes Stauffertown. Mount Joy is a natural center for this area and our high school children have been educated here for the past sixty years.

The following petition was signed by more than 98% of the taxpayers, patrons, and residents of Lower Rapho Township.

We, THE UNDERSIGNED, RESIDENTS OF RAPHO TOWNSHIP, LANCASTER COUNTY, PENNSYLVANIA, do hereby petition the MANHEIM CENTRAL SCHOOL BOARD, MANHEIM, PENNSYLVANIA to delay construction of the proposed new Two Hundred Thousand Dollar (\$200,000.00) Elementary School Building in Lower Rapho Township, Lancaster County, Pennsylvania for at least one year from the present date.

In thus petitioning the said Board we are in accord with the reasons set forth by the PATRONS COMMITTEE OF LOWER RAPHO TOWNSHIP, to the said Board at its meeting of August thirty-first (31st), 1953.

We further petition the said Board to abide by its commitments made at its meeting in Manheim, on August fourteenth (14th), 1953, consenting after motion duly made and passed, to permit the attendance of some of its pupils at school outside the District on a tuition basis.

This petition is made in triplicate and is dated September 2nd, 1953.

As a taxpayer are you in favor of increasing your debt which is now approximately one million five hundred thousand dollars (\$1,500,000.00) with an extra two hundred thousand dollars (\$200,000.00) the cost of the proposed new building?

Please give this your undivided attention and don't let a few dominate and pull the whole district toward bankruptcy.
