Is Sunday, November 15

All overseas packages should be in the mail by November 15 it was announced by the acting postmaster, Elmer L. Zerphey. The time for mailing to all A. P. O. addresses and to foreign countries had been set from October 15 to November 15. Therefore, the fifteenth is the deadline for overseas mailing.

International postage rates on first class mail will increase November 1, 1953. Canada and Mexico will remain the same; 3c per ounce. All foreign countries' first class mail will be 8c for the first ounce and 4c for each additional ounce. Post cards will be 4c for the single cards and 8c for the double
