An open house will be held in the East Donegal High School Nov. 8, 1953. Exhibits will be displayed in various rooms. From 7 to 8 o'clock parents will be able to visit with teachers and see these exhibits in the following rooms: history, room 106; mathematics, room 105; English, room 110; science, room 107; agriculture, room 111; commercial subjects, room 101; geography, room 19; foreign languages, room 103; health and music, room 115; art and home economics, room 113; industrial arts, shop.

The history and social studies classes will dramatize a United Nations session, illustrating the workings of each agency. This program is in charge of Donald Staley, chairman, assisted by C. John G. Hart, principal of the East Donegal Township High School, announced that 38 students successfully completed the driver training program held recently at the school. Each student was given a driving test through traffic conditions. In addition, all students witnessed a demonstration of "emergency stops" at speeds of 20 miles per hour and 30 miles per hour.

At the conclusion of the one-week program, the students were given grades of proficiency in driving, which grades are now recorded in the principal's office.

Of the 38 students who completed the course, eight of them passed with a grade of A. The next 17 were given grades of B; 11 completed the course with the grade of C, and the remaining two received the mark of D.

George Lowe, director of the Traffic Safety Education Program of the Atlantic Refining Company, the directors of the one-week course, explained that the tests which were developed at Pennsylvania State College, are good indications of the ability an individual has in the operation of an automobile.

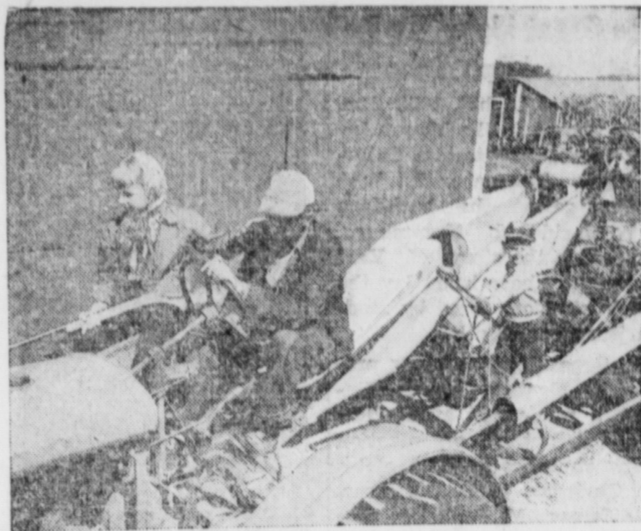

The high school faculty unanimously adopted rigorous scholastic standards for all extra-curricular activities. If a pupil fails one subject, he is ineligible for one week. At the end of the first week an eligibility sheet is taken around by the student to each teacher whose course he failed. If the pupil is doing satisfactory work, he becomes eligible for one week. This must be done each week during the six weeks until the next report period. If, at any time during the period, he is doing unsatisfactory work, the pupil will be ineligible for the remaining weeks of the report period. The faculty hopes that this will stimulate students to do better work.

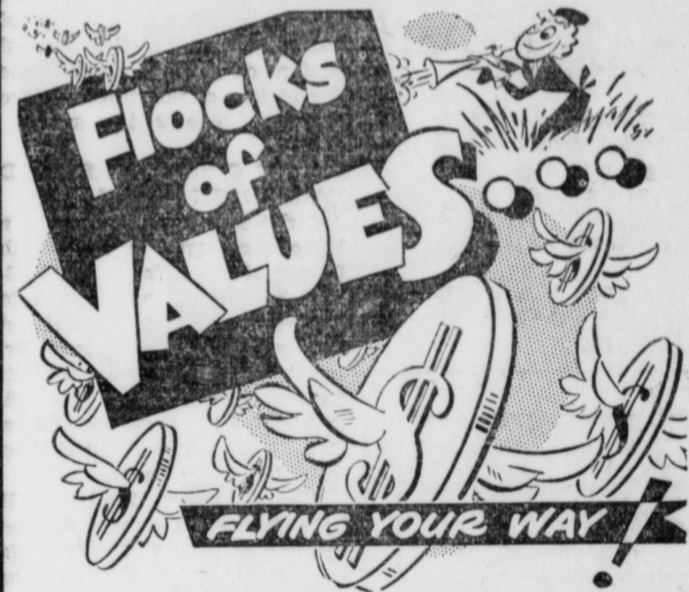
