Mortuary Record

Dr. David C. Stoner — one of the last of a vanishing tribe of country doctors—died at 12:50 p. m. Thursday at his home, after an illness of three weeks. He was seventy-six.

Dr. Stoner has May completed 53 years as a practicing physician—the last 27 years in Mt. Joy. During that time he traveled thousands of miles over county roads in both buggy and automobile and delivered hundreds of babies in three generations.

Prior to moving his practice to Mount Joy, he spent 15 years in Columbia, where he maintained an office on N. Third St. He had begun his practice at Rowmansdale, Cumberland Co., following his graduation from the University of Baltimore (now merged with the University of Maryland.)

He was born at Jonestown, Lebanon County, to the late Clinton and Barbara Phillips Stoner, and attended Lebanon schools.

May 12, 1949, on the occasion of his 50th anniversary in the medical profession, he was honored with a service plaque by the Medical Society of Pennsylvania during a luncheon at the Stevens House.

His busy practice all but made him miss the luncheon, however. After being out on calls most of the preceding evening, he was up at 5 a. m. and saw a dozen patients in his office before starting on his home calls at 9 a. m. Immediately after the luncheon there were more home calls, and he later saw still more patients in his office until 9 p. m.

His career of service was an inspiration to two of his sons to enter the professions — Dr. John C., in Columbia, and Dr. Russell P. Stoner, a Marietta physician.

He was a member of Trinity Lutheran Church, Mount Joy; the Lancaster County Medical Society; the Medical Society of Pennsylvania, and the American Medical Association.

He was a collector of antiques and enjoyed an occasional day of hunting and fishing.

Surviving, in addition to his two sons above, are his wife, the former Bertha Biever, and these children: Helen, wife of Jay Eicherly, Mount Joy; William, Los Angeles, Calif.; Maryellen, wife of Richard Hoffman,

Evansville, Ind., and Mrs. Hilda Gregg, Elizabethtown.
 Also surviving are 7 grandchildren. He was the last of his immediate family.

FRANK H. SKEEN
 Frank Hall Skeen, 74, died at 12:45 a. m. Sunday in a Lancaster hospital after an illness of nine years. He was the husband of Catherine Myers Skeen, Pinkerton Road, Mount Joy.

Born in Strasburg, a son of the late Samuel M. and Selina Hall Skeen, he was a member of the Mount Joy Methodist Church. Before his illness, he was employed by the Pennsylvania Power and Light Co., retiring in 1944. He was also a former resident of Florin.

Besides his wife, he is survived by a son, B. Franklin, of Detroit, Mich.; two daughters: Kathryn, wife of P. R. Bielmann, North Hollywood, Calif., and Helen M. wife of John A. Charles, Mount Joy. Four grandchildren and six great-grandchildren also survive.

Funeral services were held Wednesday afternoon.
