Combined Church Choirs To Sing Cantata Sunday

"The Story of Christmas", a sacred cantata by H. Alexander Matthews, will be presented by the Senior Choirs of St. Mark's Evangelical United Brethren Church, Mount Joy, and the First Church of God, Elizabethtown, on Sunday, December 20, at 7:30 p. m. at the Mount Joy church.

The devotional period preceding the cantata will be in charge of the pastor, the Rev. E. H. Ranck, D.D.

The cantata consists of four parts. Part I deals with the prophecy of the coming of the Messiah, beginning with the male chorus entitled, "Behold, the Days Come", followed by "O Emmanuel, Our King and Law-giver", by the entire choir. The announcement is described in a soprano solo, assisted by the choir.

Part II depicts the vision of the shepherds in "There Were Shepherds Abiding in the Field" a four-part girls' chorus and a male chorus. A soprano solo tells of the angel's good news to the shepherds, followed by the choir singing, "Glory to God in the Highest". The shepherds' journey to the birthplace of the Christ-child is vividly portrayed in a tenor solo and male chorus, followed by a soprano solo and chorus, "O Lovely Voices of the Sky".

"The Quest of the Magi" is the title of the third part, which includes a baritone solo and male chorus, "Behold, There Came Three Wise Men From the East", and "From the Eastern Mountains", by the choir. The presentation of the gifts by the wise men is described in a tenor solo, followed by "O Come, All Ye Faithful". A beautiful lullaby "Sleep, Holy Babe" is augmented by the choir.

Part IV "The Fulfillment of Prophecy" consists of a soprano solo and chorus in "Awake, Put Thy Strength, O Zion". The cantata closes with a brilliant anthem of praise, "Alleluia, Amen".

Driving Habits Should Change Each Season

"Driving habits, like wearing apparel, should be changed for the different seasons of the year," R. B. Maxwell, of Harrisburg, sec.-mgr. of the AAA Pa. Motor Federation representing 57 member AAA clubs throughout the State, told motorists today in a warning pointing out that changes in driving habits are essential during the winter months.

"Hazards of winter driving require that motorists make changes in their driving habits, Mr. Maxwell stated. "Ice or snow on streets and highways requires a different style of driving than that used when roads are dry.

"Ice or snow-covered roads demand greater care in driving on the part of the motorist," he said. "Even under the best of conditions, it takes only a fraction of a second for an accident to occur."

Among the changes to be made in driving habits for greater safety during the winter suggested by the AAA official were the matter of alertness, speed and braking practices.

"While motorists should pay strict attention to their driving during both good weather and bad, even greater care should be exercised when roads are covered with ice or snow" he said. "Greater alertness is essential when driving under adverse conditions.

Regardless of what the speed the motorist is accustomed to drive or what the speed limit may be for any particular section," Mr. Maxwell continued "the speed should be reduced when highways and streets are wet, icy or covered with snow in order that the car can be kept under control at all times, even if an unexpected emergency arises.

"Driving at the legal speed is all right under good conditions" he said, "but reducing speed to meet hazardous conditions is the mark of a good driver. It's one of the most important changes that should be made in driving habits during the winter months.

"Motorists should also remember the importance of breaking habits in connection with

safe driving. Braking habits should be adjusted to meet the winter driving hazards." Warning that stopping distances are greatly increased when roads are wet, icy or snow covered, Mr. Maxwell concluded: "Start braking a little sooner and remember it is extremely hazardous to jam on the brakes, especially on ice. By beginning the brakes process a little earlier than under normal conditions, the brakes should be applied gradually to bring the car to a safe halt without the danger of going into a skid."




