**Under The Basket**

Did you see the "Big Freeze"? The Manheim Central Basketball team used it against our local Rams last Friday but to no avail.

It was the weirdest contest ever witnessed by local fans. The Mount Joy coach failed to see what was to be gained by such tactics.

In the first place it did not help the relationship between the two schools. In fact, it was a very disgusting event for the paying fans to see.

A former player of Manheim, who sat behind the Mount Joy bench, informed the local coach that he didn't want to be associated with the Manheim team.

If the Manheim team would have started to play orthodox basketball during the third period, then there would have been a purpose for the "freeze". Mt. Joy had a very small 7 point lead which a good team could overcome. Since Manheim still resorted to the "freeze" during the third period, then the local coach could not see the true purpose for the "freeze".

In 1951-52 Mount Joy had a completely green team but never used such tactics in order to keep the score from mounting. That same green team lost six of their first 8 games. Among those defeats were 82-28 and 67-47 losses to E-town and Marietta respectively. They also lost to Manheim, Hempfield and E. Donegal.

The second half of the season found the Rams defeating the last three mentioned schools and losing to E-town 46-44 and Marietta 46-45 in an extra period. You can see by these results how a team can improve by playing. They ended their 51-52 season with an 8-3 record the poorest record the local coach has had since coming to Mount Joy in 1949.

Now for the game itself—Mt. Joy controlled the opening tap and Zeller was fouled in his attempt for a goal. The foul was converted and the Rams led 1-0. Manheim immediately obtained possession of the ball, and held (and I do mean held) the ball until 25 seconds were remaining before the end of the first quarter. At this time Gibble tried an unsuccessful field goal. Metzler rebounded the ball, passed to Nissley, who was fouled in an attempted field goal. "Pete" made one of his two attempts as the quarter ended with the score 2-0.

The second period found the Barons still using the same tactics. After Metzler scored for the Rams, following the tap, the Barons held the ball until Ashenfelter tied one of their players up causing a jump ball. The Rams got the tap and Zeller was fouled attempting his second field goal attempt. He made the foul and the score was 5 to 0. Manheim tried an outside shot just before the half ended. Klugh rebounded the ball and passed to Ashenfelter who "hit" Metzler under the basket for 2 points. This ended the scoring of the first half with the score an unbelievable 7-0.

Mount Joy attempted three shots and made two during the first half. Manheim failed on 3 attempts.

It was not until the final period that the Barons decided to tangle with the Rams. The results favored the local team. They scored 23 points in that final period. Metzler and Klugh sat on the bench during the final two minutes as Eby and Nauman replaced them.

The local Rams split with a pair of games against Lititz. The Junior Varsity lost by an overwhelming score of 47-16. Although they were at a terrific height disadvantage, the team played rather badly. Poor passing and ball handling plus a lack of good defense work played a large part in the defeat.

In the Varsity game, the locals had a good second period by outscoring their opponents 14-6. During this surge, Metzler made 5 goals. The half time found the locals leading 28-19.

Lititz made a strong comeback during the second half. They actually outscored the locals, 33-29.

In general, the local Rams were poor in their passing. Metzler led the scoring with twenty five points with Klugh finishing strong for 17 points. In fact, captain Klugh garnered ten points during the final period to help clinch the victory.

At the present time the local coach has had his squad cut to 14 players. Weber and Beaton are ineligible for the present while C. Groff was injured during a practice session last Monday evening.

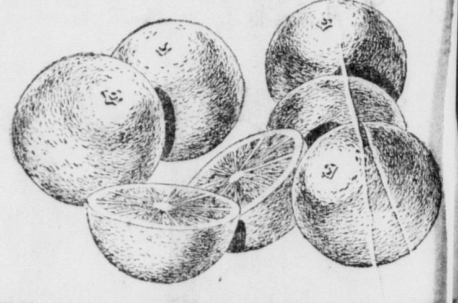
