**News Items From E. D. Twp. School**  
 The Junior Red Cross Club baked 41 dozens of cookies which were sent to the New Cumberland Depot.  
 The following seniors under the supervision of Mrs. Betty Lutze, Commercial teacher, typed the following speeds - this week: Beverly Covert-61 words with 1 error; Lovina Demmy - 61 words with 5 errors; Milton Mowrer - 59 words with 5 errors.  
 The 10th grade made Christmas Cards using the typewriter and colored carbon paper.  
 Each year, the Pennsylvania Music Educators' Association sponsors district and state music festivals which include choral and instrumental presentations. The state is divided into ten districts, each district sponsoring its own chorus, orchestra, and band festival. From the musicians who participate in the district festivals, the personnel for the state festivals are chosen. Therefore, it is necessary for a student to enter a district festival in order to have a chance to take part in a state festival.  
 This year, the Manheim Central High School will be host to the Southern District Band festival which includes all school musicians in Lancaster County and neighboring counties.  
 Any student who wishes to participate in this festival must prepare either of two selected solos for his instrument for audition at William Penn High School in Harrisburg, Saturday, January 9. These tryouts are conducted by the music teachers of the district.  
 Four students from East Donegal High School will try out for this year's district band at Harrisburg. These students are now preparing the required solos for the tryouts: Barbara Martin, flute; Ross Eshleman, trumpet; Betty McKain, clarinet; and Ronald Hawthorne, snare drum. Mr. H. Morrell Shields, instrumental teacher, will accompany them and assist in the try outs.

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**Student Recognition Service Scheduled**  
 A "Student Recognition" service will be held in the St. Mark's Evangelical United Brethren Church Sunday evening, December 28, 7:30 p. m. Short talks will be given by representatives of the various colleges and nurses' training centers at the program.  
 Dr. Ezra Ranck will deliver a message following the talks. Robert Clay, Palmyra, will be the guest musician and will play a cello solo. Mr. Clay graduated from Lebanon Valley College in 1953. The Youth Fellowship is in charge of the service.

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**Doners May Claim Scout Furniture**  
 At the present time, not all the furniture has been removed from the Girl Scouts rooms of the Welfare Building located on North Market Street. Several pieces of furniture were donated by individuals at the time the girls moved into the rooms. If those persons would like to have the furniture back, they are to contact Mrs. Edward Lane, Donegal Springs Road, before Christmas.  
 After Christmas, those items which have not been claimed will be stored until permanent quarters are obtained.

**Shortwave Radio Is Voted For Lititz Too**  
 A second town in Lancaster County took action regarding a police-car shortwave radio following the Mount Joy Borough Council's decision to purchase one.  
 Mount Joy decided to purchase a set at the regular meeting of the group Monday evening, Dec. 7. Two weeks ago, Elizabethtown councilmen discussed the situation and last week, the Lititz borough council held a special meeting to discuss the matter.  
 Lititz voted on the matter and hopes to have the equipment installed by January 1. Calls will be received through the Lititz office.

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**Penna. Game Commission Weekly Letter**  
 The following information was gleaned from field reports on the 1953 buck deer season.  
 Game protectors estimate the legal antlered deer kill at a little over 25,000. The buck population was comparable to that of 1952 and the hunting pressure was normal, as compared to that of other recent years.  
 The weather was mixed but was fairly desirable. There was little snow to aid buck hunters. Deer taken were in good flesh. Racks were generally more uniform in structure but light of beam, and deer were still small of stature.  
 Known human gun casualties in the buck season were: 9 fatal and 30 non-fatal.  
 Reports on the recent antlerless deer season indicate that, once again, weather was a deciding factor in limiting hunter success.  
 In setting the "doe" license allocation for last season at nearly 104,000 the Game Commission hoped there would be a reported kill of about 16,000 antlerless deer, an actual harvest in the neighborhood of 22,000.  
 Miserable weather the first day of the antlerless deer season reduced the number of hunters and the hours they spent afield. Across the northern tier counties and those in the southwest there was snow. In the southern and southeastern counties, rain made hunting uncomfortable. Poor visibility, caused by fog and rain, added to hunter troubles.  
 The 1953 antlerless deer kill was estimated by game protectors to be about 10,200. Human casualties in the two-day antlerless season were: fatal 0; non-fatal, 4.  
**Deer Hides Have Value**  
 Pennsylvania game authorities urge hunters not to waste a valuable product of the hunt. Too often deer hides lie forgotten and spoiling during the holiday season and are thrown away eventually. These hides should be heavily salted, preferably with coarse salt, should be rolled up flesh side in, and kept in a cold place.  
 Lacking any special use for the hide the owner may derive profit from its sale to fur buyers, hide dealers or tanners. Wearing apparel made of buck roe doe skin is durable and beautiful. The deer hide—product of the successful hunt—should not be wasted.  
**Foxes Returned to Rabies Areas**  
 During the Pennsylvania campaign against rabid foxes, in the late winter and spring of 1952, fears were expressed in some quarters lest foxes and other wildlife be eradicated completely in the areas treated.  
 In the fall and winter of 1953, bounty claims and reports from trappers show that foxes have returned in considerable numbers to areas where poison bait was used in the rabies program of the Game Commission and the Department of Health. This bears out what wildlifers have learned, that following any such effort the vacuum created is quickly filled from surrounding untreated areas.  
 Reports on 1953 small game hunting and trapping success indicate that game and fur species were at least as abundant in rabies areas as previous to the control campaign. In some of these localities small wildlife appeared even more numerous.

**Holstein Cow Tested At Battleboro**  
 With 14,615 pounds of milk and 566 pounds of butterfat for her credit, Bessie Pabst Madoline, a registered Holstein-Friesian cow owned by Joseph A. Hook and Herman G. Ginder, Jr., Mount Joy, has completed a 365-Herd Improvement Registry. She produced an average of nineteen quarts of milk daily for six years and nine months when she began her testing program.

**Fishing Prizes Are Announced By Club**  
 Six Lancaster County residents won prizes in the annual Hydro Fishing Club Contest sponsored by the Pennsylvania Water & Power Company and the Safe Harbor Water Poyer Corporation, in cooperation with the Federated Sportsmen of Lancaster and York Counties.  
 For the past several years the Power Companies have put up \$200 to go to fishermen whose entries—caught in Lake Aldred, above Holtwood and Lake Clarke, above Safe Harbor—have taken first, second or third place in four categories. These are, Bass, Susquehanna Salmon, Catfish and Carp.  
 The \$30 first prize in the Bass division was won by a William J. Lausch, 116 Nevins St., Lancaster with his three pound, 18 inch entry. Other winners in the Bass division were from Lancaster County; the \$15 second prize was awarded to Harry C. Graham, Neffville, for his 2-9 pound, 18 1/2 inch fish while M. B. Brenner, Conestoga R2, took the \$5 third prize with his 2.1 pound, 16 inch Bass.  
 In the Susquehanna Salmon division, all three winners entered fish weighing 6-1 pounds and prizes were allocated on length, as provided for in the rules. The \$30 first prize went to Bruce E. Snyder, of York, whose fish was 27 inches long, second prize of \$15 went to Earl W. Eshleman, 719 Columbia Ave., Lancaster, 26 inches, and third prize of \$5 went to Frank E. Fisher, York County, 25 1/2 inches.  
 Franklin Kissinger, Columbia again made an appearance in the winner's list taking first and third prizes in the Catfish division, with one entry 12.7 lbs., 28 1/2 inches long, the other 7.5 lbs., 26 1/2 inches long. A York resident, C. M. Heilig, Sr., took second place in this division with an 11.5 pound, 33 inch long Catfish.  
 Two residents of Lebanon, Andrew Gaidos and John J. Greish won first and second prizes, respectively in the Carp division. Mr. Gaidos' fish weighed 27.4 pounds and measured 35 inches while Mr. Greish's was 27 pounds and measured 36 1/2 inches. A 27 pound, 36 inch long Carp entered by Howard K. Eddy, Boyerstown, Pa., took third prize in this division.
