State Announces Driver Training Continued

Pledging continued support of the driver training program in the State's high schools, C. S. Klugh, of Harrisburg, general manager of the Pennsylvania Automotive Assoc., today disclosed that Pennsylvania's new car dealers are contributing approximately one million dollars to traffic safety education, represented by about 400 cars they are now making available for use in such courses without any charge.

Tracing the rapid advancement of the program since it has gained support from the Commonwealth's automobile dealers, Mr. Klugh cited the values and benefits of driver training instruction to high school students; views similar to those held by prominent State officials.

Cooperation of dealers with schools not presently offering a driver training course to students by providing a car for behind-the-wheel training was also promised whenever possible by the official, who explained that the program is entirely under the control of the school district. He also added that the decision to inaugurate a driver training course rests strictly

with the school district. "Despite the fact that driver training got its start in Pennsylvania in the early 1930's, the program in this State did not gain impetus until about eight years ago when the automobile dealers got behind the movement," Mr. Klugh pointed out. "Pennsylvania's new car dealers are gratified at the progress being made in this endeavor," he said, "but hope to see the time when driver training instruction is available to students in each of the 927 high schools in the Commonwealth."

There are now an estimated 444 high schools offering driver education and about 45,000 students participating, according to a report made recently by Ivan J. Stehman, chief of Highway Safety Education in the State Department of Public Instruction.

"Dealers feel that since they sell cars to the public they can make a contribution to their safety on the highways by actively supporting a program which will instill good driving practices into our future drivers," Mr. Klugh stated.

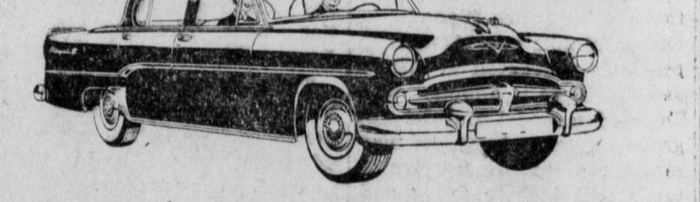
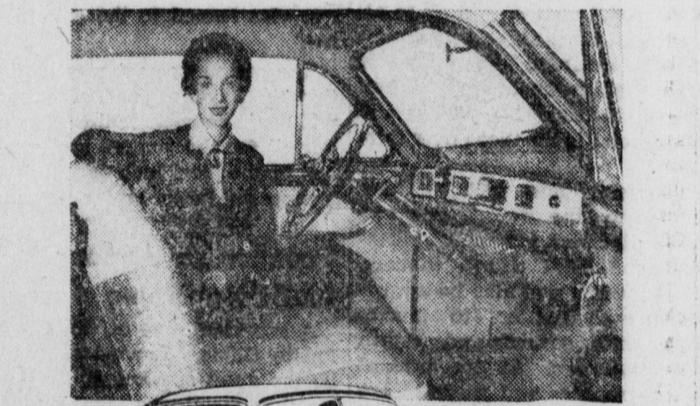
