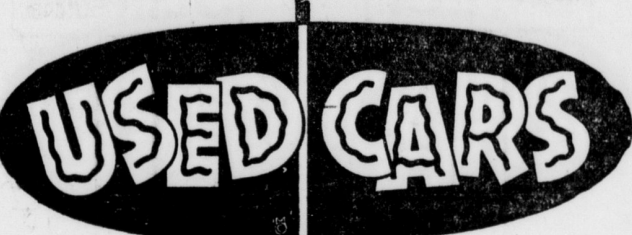

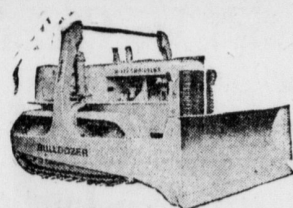

Prizes were awarded in the Sportsmen contest to Mrs. Norman Linton, William Fackler, C. N. Miller, Carl Garber, C. Nissley, R. E. Hassinger, Howard Brown and William Fackler. The group also discussed stocking the Little Chiques Creek from Lebanon to the Mount Joy dam with trout. Paid memberships for one year were awarded the farmers in attendance who open their lands to hunters.

## Penna. Game Commission Weekly Letter

So far this winter severe weather has not hurt wildlife in Pennsylvania. Drawing from past experience, however, and the knowledge natural food for game in the wooded northern counties is extremely scarce, the Game Commission has taken action to aid in ensuring that wild turkeys especially will survive the critical months in good condition.

Numerous sportsmen's organizations in the northern tier counties realize too, that the great birds need help in any winter, and they are doing an exemplary and extensive job of supplemental feeding in the woodlands. Farther south, an outstanding example is furnished by Blair County sportsmen, sparked by the Altoona Wildlife Club. Blair County lies just south of Conservation Club. Though an east-west line across the middle of the state a goodly supply of turkeys and other wild game live within its borders.

In the winter of 1951-52 a group of sportsmen from Altoona and vicinity organized to cooperate with Game Protector Dean M. Crooks in the winter feeding of wild turkeys in the woodlands of their own county and bordering ones. This group has since constructed nearly 50 deer-proof feeders from poles and branches found at construction points. The feeders hold 8 to 20 bushels of ear corn, are "roofed" with hemlock bows and are located mostly along spring runs in valleys where wild turkeys harbor in severe weather.

Emulating the wonderful program of their brethren in the timbered northern counties, truck and car to points near feeders on week-ends. From there it is carried on human lap bags, often 1 or 2 miles, to these sportsmen haul corn by backs, in pack baskets and bur-b deposited in feeders located in five different mountain ranges. Junior Sportsmen and Boy Scouts land their young energy to the project.

This is a far-sighted, humane effort wherever conducted. Surprising to those who do not know the feelings of true sportsmen, the men who avidly hunt the bird in fall now turn about to become the turkey's benefactor.

### Possession Limit For Wild Game

The Game Commission advises that persons who possess resident wild game lawfully taken in the 1953 season may keep such game only until and including July 1, 1954. A permit is no longer required.

Migratory game birds lawfully taken in the 1953 season may, by federal regulations, "be possessed for 90 days immediately following the close of the open season where killed." This requirement covers migratory game birds taken in any state in the United States, Puerto Rico, or Alaska, or imported from Canada, Mexico, or any other foreign country.

At its regular January meeting today the Pennsylvania Game Commission set tentative opening dates of the 1954 game hunting seasons. The season openers will not be official until the July meeting of the Commission when seasons and bag limits will be officially established. The probable times are given in January to help hunters set vacation periods.

Here are the tentative opening dates:

- Small game - October 30.
- Bow and arrow deer season - October 11
- Antlered deer - November 29
- Bear - December 1

A closed season on hares (snowshoe rabbits) has been suggested because of a reported decline in the state's population of this animal. The Commission is giving the brood stock and conditions very close study, following which a close season on snowshoes may be declared for next winter.
