had been added to the community Christmas decorations for 1953. Business men contributed \$1,129 to the project, and \$424 was applied to additional purchases this year. Mr. Sprecher pointed out that it required 170 man hours to erect and take down the units, and that the time increases as more units are purchased.

Wilbur I. Beahm, principal of the joint school, reported on progress on the building now under construction on the Marietta pike. He said that the project, scheduled for completion June 1, is about four weeks behind schedule but that the contractor has expressed hopes of making up time if the weather is satisfactory. Mr. Beahm distributed plans showing the layout of the building.

The meeting closed with a discussion on what might be done with the old grade school property when it becomes vacant with the completion of the new school. Paul D. Stoner stated that the school board is anxious CHAMBER OF COM. continued to have views from organizations such as the Chamber of Commerce.

A. D. Seiler, president of the school board, suggested that the building might be torn down and a modern community center be constructed at the rear of the property with the remainder of the land being used for a playground. He expressed hope that the property might be retained for some useful community purpose.

Mr. Seiler pointed out that while the board has broad authority in dealing with the problem the school directors are open to suggestions from the public and will welcome them. Present plans, he stated, are to begin demolishing the building as soon as the new one is completed.
