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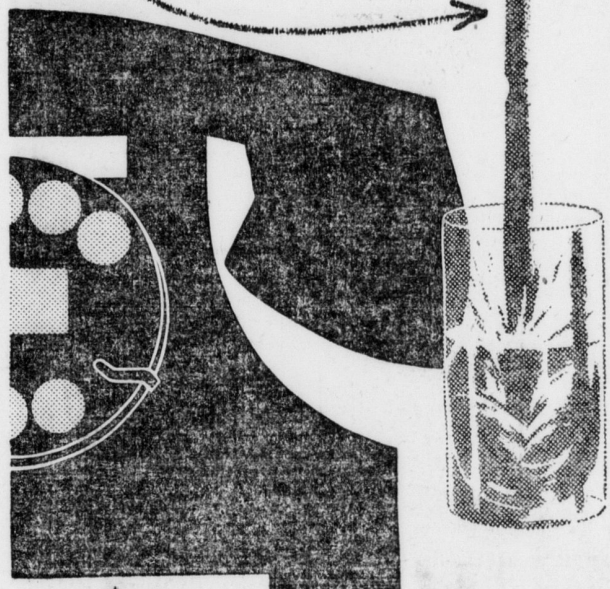
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Under The Basket

Penna. Game Commission Weekly Letter

The Pennsylvania Game Commission, at its January meeting, acted to remove the weasel from the bounty list effective June 1, 1954. The Game Commission has paid \$1 for the hide of this little animal for years.

Other bounty rewards will remain the same as at present until June 1, 1955. They are \$4 for each gray or red fox and \$5 for each great horned owl, adult or fledgling, killed during all months excepting November and December.

Reasons given for removing the weasel are: 1. No positive proof exists that weasels limit the amount of small game for hunting. 2. The high fur value of the animal assures a large harvest without special reward. 3. At least three-quarters of all weasels taken would have been killed at farms and elsewhere if bounty was paid or not. 4. Food habits studies show a great preponderance of the animal's diet is mice and other small rodents.

To Operate Howard Nursery
On the 1st of January, 1954, the Pennsylvania Game Commission leased the Howard Nursery from the U. S. Soil Conservation Service. The agreement is on a year-to-year basis.

The nursery is located two miles southwest of the town of Howard in Centre County. It was originally established by the Soil Conservation Service. It was operated on a rental basis by the Pennsylvania Department of Forests and Waters for nearly seven years, ending December 31, 1953.

The size of the property is almost 77 acres, about three-fourths of which are used for the production of tree and shrub seedlings.

The Game Commission plans to use seedlings grown in the Howard Nursery on State game lands, farm game projects and other areas it leases in the state, to provide better food and cover conditions for wildlife.

Porley Is Undoing Of Wildcat, Game Protector Charles F. Keiper, Renovo, Clinton County, reports: "Last small game season, Paul Combs, of York, Pa., killed a bobcat in the Couderport Pike area. Evidently the cat was 'indisposed' when shot, because its face and the inside of its mouth were full of porcupine quills. The emaciated wildcat had evidently tackled an offensive meal and may eventually have died of starvation."

"Perhaps," mused Keiper, "credit should be given to the porcupine for predator control assistance."

Postoffice News

Two of the most common mistakes made by patrons in mailing letters deals with the question of insufficient postage. Both of which many times delay the distribution of the mail.

One of these errors is the postage on first class mail. Many people believe that if a letter is heavy and takes additional postage, one or two cents more will be suffice. This is wrong. Postage on first class mail is three cents for one ounce and three cents for each additional ounce.

In other words if a letter is more than one ounce and less than two ounces, the postage is six cents and not for or five as many people think. Letters of 1 ounce the postage is three cents, two ounces, six cents, three oz., nine cents, etc.

When a letter arrives at the office with insufficient postage, it is marked postage due and sent on, or the addressee is notified to send postage for the letter, or it is returned to the sender if a return address is known. In either case the letter is delayed. One should be sure to have sufficient postage on letters before mailing them.

The other and more serious of the errors is the mailing of birth announcements or party announcements, which contain written information as to time, place and date, for two cents. Letters or cards of this type bearing written information constitute a message and therefore must go first class mail and should be sealed.

Every week announcements of this type are dropped for mailing, and the occasion is rare when sufficient postage is on the letter. Please remember—Announcements as described above take three cents. So if invitations or birth announcements are sent in an envelope, be sure that the postage is correct.

When in doubt, feel free to consult the clerks at the office. Correct information may save time and trouble when it comes to mailing.

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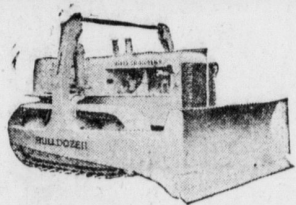
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
