Weddings for the week included Miss Margaret Harnish and Edward Hendrix; Miss Gloria C. Warta and Randle P. Gossling.

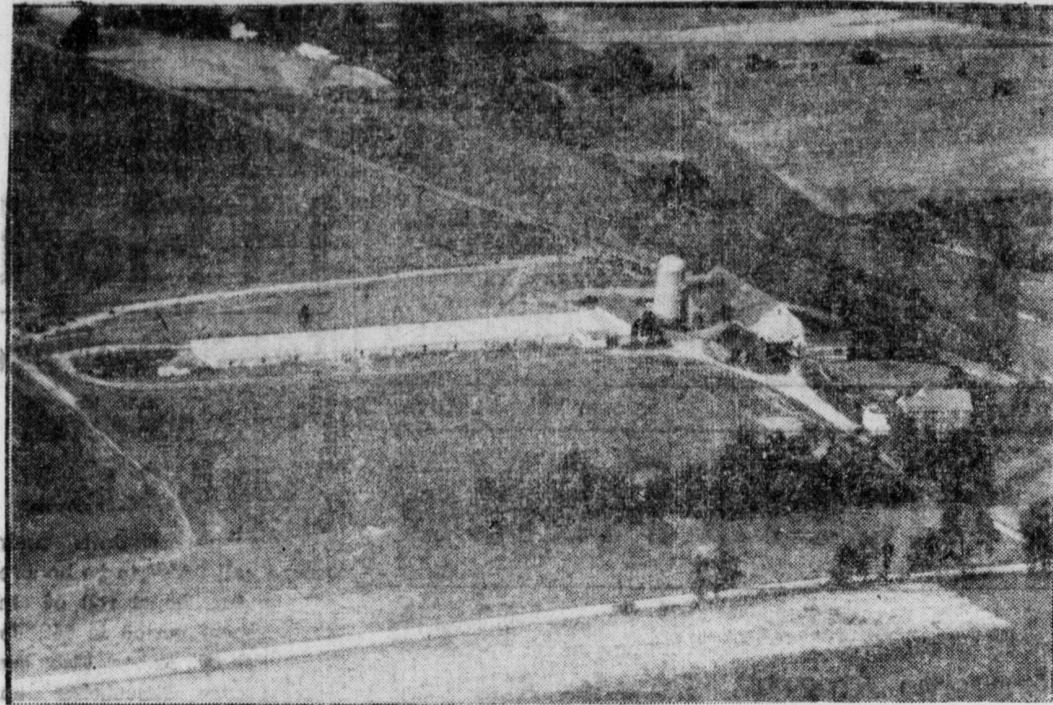
