## Penna. Game Commission Weekly Letter

The propagation division of the Game Commission reports the following game releases during 1953:

Ringneck pheasants, 112,805 of which 71,170 were raised at the State Game Farms. Wild turkeys numbered 6,182. Bobwhite quail liberated were 10,007. Wild ducks (in the duck banding program) totaled 7,104. The number of cottontail rabbits (wild trapped) released in '53 was 52,779.

Day-old pheasants were shipped from State Game Farms to: Sportsmen, 65,230; Farm Game Cooperators, 160,202. The Farm Game Cooperators and sportsmen successfully reared 130,477 of the birds to maturity. This is about 81% of the pheasant chicks allotted them, an excellent record.

**Hunters Liked Last Season**  
Along the line numerous other game protectors have commented recently, L. B. Welch, a Huntingdon County game protector, says: "According to reports being received, people who hunted deer last season saw more wild turkeys and larger flocks than in any deer season in the last ten or 12 years. Their report on other small game is just as good. They claim they saw and bagged more game in '53 than any time for many years."

**Lady Deer Sport Antlers**  
Leslie H. Wood, a game protector living at Wellsboro, recently turned in some interesting information about the head adornments of Tioga County doe deer. Says Wood, "During the last hunting season Miss Sylvia Carlson, of Antrim, Pa., killed a doe with a large set of nine point antlers. Within the past several years three doe deer with antlers were bagged in my district, and all of them by women."

Along the same line, Game Protector D. W. Heacock, of Irwin, Westmoreland County, says: "A doe deer killed in my district during the '53 buck season had a 2½ inch spike horn on the left side of the head and a 1½ inch spike on the other. The spikes were still in velvet."

**Variance Between Bear Kill and Report**  
Knowledge of the actual bear kill in any year is important to the state authorities in planning the next season. Aware that some bear hunters do not report their kills the Game Commission's research chief made a survey of bear tag reports received since the 1953 season.

Of 193 bears checked by the game protectors in that season 26 were not reported to the Harrisburg office of the Game Commission by mid-January. (The law requires that reports of big game kills be mailed to the Game Commission, Harrisburg, within 5 days after the close of season.) This check-up indicates that about 13.5 percent of the bears bagged last season were not reported. Compared

with other season figures this is considered a fairly high return. In some instances bear kills were reported on the same tag with deer kills. The separation and count of deer kills by sex and antler growth is still going on, therefore it will be some time before final tabulations of the bear and deer harvests of '53 are available, game officials say.

**Hunter Turns Retriever**  
Andrew Ewart, a food and cover crops foreman for the Game Commission, tells this: "Mr. J. Harold Arnold, a Farm Game Cooperator in Fayette Co., told me about a man who hunted ducks on his pond last fall and was successful in bringing one down in the middle of the pond. "The hunter had no way of reaching the bird from shore but, determined to retrieve his kill, he peeled off his clothes, swam out and brought the duck in. It was on one of the colder days during the waterfowl season and he shivered for some time afterward. Mr. Arnold stated it was hard to turn down men who wished to hunt on his farm when they enjoyed their sport well enough to swim in icy water to retrieve their game."

**Old Records And Comparisons**  
Early in January, Game Protector David Titus made these comments: "Several days after the close of the recent deer season, the Warren, Pa. Mirror carried a 1923 news item I found quite interesting. At the close of the hunting season, 30 years ago Game Protector Elmer Pilling released these big game kill figures for all of Warren County: legal male deer, 48; legal bears, 22."

"Compare these figures with 1953 season in my district, which comprises that portion of Warren County east of the Allegheny River. My estimate is there was a total of about 1,250 legal bucks and antlerless deer killed in my portion of the county alone. Also, during the year 1953 we have record of 137 deer killed on highways in this district, plus 14 killed for property damage."

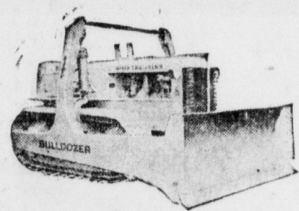
