Eleven Farms To Be First On Program

Monday night, March 15, the directors of the Lancaster Soil Conservation District approved applications for conservation plans on the following farms:

Lester H. Wolgemuth, John J. Herr, Paul Z. Hess, Jacob E. Brubaker, Paul N. Brubaker, Elmer S. Myers, Leroy R. Heisey, Mount Joy R1; Owen E. Mummau, Mt. Joy R2; Lloyd Fuhrman, Marietta, Wilmer W. Kreider, Manheim R3 and John B. Losensky, Litzitz R4.

Robert S. Cruickshank, specialist in soils, was introduced to the directors by W. Martin Muth, conservationist in charge. Mr. Cruickshank plans to map the soil, slope and erosion on the farms in the northwest part of the County within the next year. This area of approximately 80,000 acres remains to complete the soils mapping for Lancaster County. The work was started in 1936 with the mapping of the Conesoga, Pequea Creek watersheds. The maps were published in 1940 by the Soil Conservation Service of the U. S. Dept. of Agriculture. Additional mapping was done in 1940 and individual farms of district cooperators have been mapped.

The group of cooperators south of Mount Joy will be the first large scale soils mapping to be done in this section of the County. It is hoped that the farmers will be able to assist Mr. Cruickshank in his work by accompanying him as he maps the soil, slope and erosion on their farms.

According to word received at press time from Samuel Dock, agent of the Mount Joy Pennsylvania Railroad Station, tentative plans have been made to run an excursion train to Wilkes Barre Monday night.

The train would travel a direct route from Mount Joy to Wilkes Barre without any changeover. Railroad mileage roundtrip from Mount Joy to Wilkes Barre is 282.4 miles. Already three establishments have offered pledges to help finance the train.
