Hart Named Vice-Principal Of School

John G. Hart, New Haven St. principal of the East Donegal Township High School and Ralph Coleman, principal of the Marietta Schools, were appointed Vice-principals of the Donegal Joint High School at the regular meeting of the group last Thursday in the Marietta High School library.

Although the group went into executive session, it was announced prior to the session that the salaries would be around \$5,600.

Local Dentist Chosen

Dr. Harold Fellenbaum, Donegal Springs Road, Mount Joy, was chosen dental examiner of the school on the first ballot with a majority of votes over Dr. William Simons, Marietta.

Dr. Russell Stoner, won on the second ballot for medical examiner over Dr. John Gates, Mount Joy and Dr. Michael Gratch, Maytown. The names of Dr. Fellenbaum and Dr. Stoner will now be forwarded to Dr. Oscar Davis, county medical director, for approval by the State. Recommendations were also received for a head custodian and two assistants, a chief manager of the cafeteria and five cafeteria workers.

Discussed was the possibility of making the district a complete jointure from grades one to 12 since the present set-up is 7-12. Also to have been discussed was the naming of the basketball coach for the new school. No announcement was made on the subject following the session.

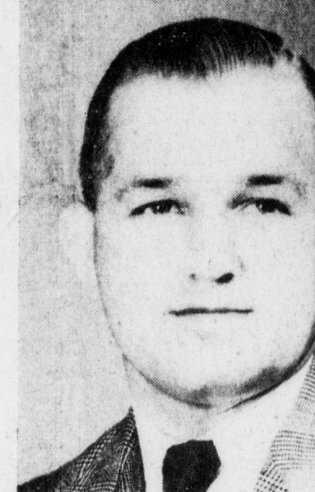
