State Platoon Of Women To Be Formed

Formation of a Pennsylvania Women's Army Corps Platoon composed of forty selected women high school graduates from the State of Pennsylvania was announced by M/Sgt. E. J. McGurren NCO in charge of the Army and Air Force Recruiting Station located at Room 217 Post Office Bldg., Lancaster, Pa.

The group to be known as the "Pennsylvania Platoon" will be made up of women from the Lancaster County area and cities throughout Pennsylvania.

"Swearing-in" ceremonies of the WAC Pennsylvania Platoon will take place at the end of June, date to be announced later, at the State Capitol with Governor Fine and other high officials participating.

After the ceremony, the forty Pennsylvania WAC's will depart by special pullman for the new Women's Army Corps Center at Fort McClellan, Alabama. They will be the first group to arrive at this new center. Formerly all women were sent to Fort Lee, Va.

To qualify, women must be high school graduates, 18 to 35 years of age, single, with no dependents and a U. S. citizen.

In the Lancaster County area women may apply for enlistment in the "Pennsylvania Platoon" at the Army and Air Force Recruiting Station located at Post Office Bldg., Lancaster. Phone Lancaster 7724.

FIFTEEN YEARS AGO

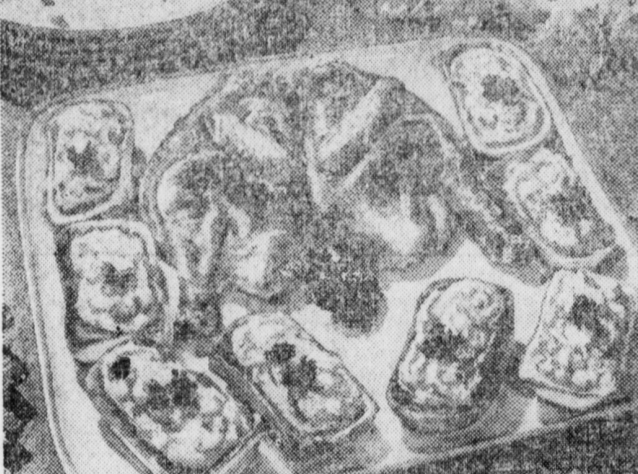
June 1, 1939

SPICY RELISH ROLLS . . . to serve with fried chicken

To the natural tang of the canned apple sauce is added the lively bite of chopped scallions, curry powder and crunchy celery pieces. The result is a spirited relish with a spicy freshness of flavor. Stuffed into the rolls and eaten with chicken it makes chicken taste better than chicken ever tasted before. The tangy fla-

vor also goes happily with pork, veal and lamb. As a variation, try serving the relish plain sometimes, without the rolls. When you do that, chill the relish instead of dishing it up hot. Good!

- Spicy Relish Rolls**
¼ cup chopped scallions
2 tablespoons butter
1 cup diced celery
1½ teaspoons curry powder
1 tablespoon cold water
1¾ cups canned apple sauce
4 crusty rolls

Saute scallions in butter. Combine scallions, celery and apple sauce. Mix curry powder with cold water. Add to apple sauce mixture; blend well. Halve crusty rolls; scoop out center. Spread inside with butter. Place apple sauce mixture in rolls. Bake in moderately hot oven, 375° F., 20 minutes, or until heated. Serve as an accompaniment to fried or broiled spring chicken. Yields 4 servings.
