**County Poultry
 Affair Is June 5**

Lancaster County chickens
 are featured players in a mo-
 tion picture now showing in
 Pennsylvania—and scenes from
 this film will be reenacted in
 life at Lititz next week.

The scenes were filmed in
 color last year when 3,200 Lan-
 caster County city folks and
 farmers got together to eat
 crisp, brown chicken barbecued
 over open pits. The Pennsylvania
 State University produced
 the film to show folks in other
 counties just how successful a
 public chicken barbecue can be.

Only the chickens will be
 new on Saturday, June 5, at
 Lititz, when the Lancaster
 County Poultry Association
 stages its fourth annual public
 barbecue. The cooks, dish wash-
 ers, waiters and handymen will
 be same Lancaster County poultry
 farmers who made this event
 the largest in Pennsylvania.

There are a couple of new en-
 tertainment features—one a
 chicken cooking and recipe con-
 test with eight amateur chefs
 preparing chicken dishes before
 the public.

And for rural folks, Future
 Farmers of America from the
 Lampeter-Strasburg and Manor
 Joint high schools are prepar-
 ing educational displays.

But the high spot of the after-
 noon and evening program will
 be selection of a Lancaster Co.
 poultry queen from ten lovely
 contestants. Miss Helen Ann
 Graybill, of Manheim R3, the
 reigning Lancaster County and
 Pennsylvania queen will be on
 hand to preside at the corona-
 tion of her successor.

Serving of barbecued chicken
 halves will start at 4 p. m. and
 continue until 8 p. m. or the
 last person is fed, the poultry-
 men promise.

Lititz Spring Park provides
 additional space for the expect-
 ed crowd of 5,000, and new bar-
 becue pits promise speedy serv-
 ing, the committee advises.

Poultry farmers, hatchery-
 men and feed dealers are now
 selling tickets at \$1.50 for ad-
 ults and 75 cents for children.

**Five Cows Have
 Completed Testing**

 Elm Blossom Torr, a registered
 Holstein owned by J. Lester
 Charles, Landisville, recently
 completed her test totalling 12-
 436 pounds of milk and 413
 pounds butterfat in 342 days.
 Milked twice daily, Elm Bloss-
 om Torr was 5 years, 10 mos.
 of age when her testing began.
 Her total was about 2 1/4 times
 the average U. S. cow.

Averaging 16 quarts daily,
 Clovena Rena Letha Jannek, a
 registered Holstein owned by
 H. M. Hess, Mount Joy, recently
 completed her test totalling 12-
 907 pounds of milk and 554
 pounds butterfat in 365 days.
 Milked twice daily, Jannek was
 9 years 9 months of age when
 her testing began. Her total was
 about 2 1/4 times the average U.
 S. cow.

Averaging 22 quarts daily,
 Elgan Kent Rag Apple Sanar, a
 registered Holstein owned by J.
 Hook and H. G. Ginder, Jr., Mt.
 Joy, recently completed her test
 and 516 pounds butterfat in 312
 totalling 14,865 pounds of milk
 days. Milked twice daily, Sanar
 was 4 years 3 months of age
 when her testing began. Her to-
 tal was about 2 3/4 times the av-
 erage U. S. cow.

Averaging 19 quarts daily,
 Cylon Homestead Burke, a reg-
 istered Holstein owned by M.
 M. Wenger, Rheems, recently
 completed her test totalling 13-
 487 pounds milk and 528 lbs.
 butterfat in 297 days. Milked
 twice daily, Burke was 7 years
 2 months of age when her test-
 ing began. Her total was about
 2 1/2 times the average U. S.
 cow.

Averaging 19 quarts daily,
 Fonda Carnation Model Sup-
 reme, a registered Holstein
 owned by A. W. Wickenheiser,
 Mount Joy, recently completed
 her test totalling 14,181 pounds
 of milk and 430 pounds of but-
 terfat in 342 days. Milked twice
 daily, Supreme was six years of
 age when testing began. Her to-
 tal was 2 3/4 times the average
 U. S. cow.

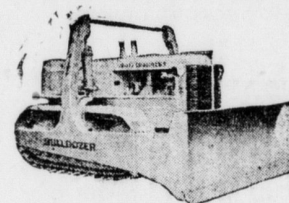
