Local Man Awarded Degree In Georgia

Robert Q. Sload, Mount Joy R1, was graduated from the Georgia Institute of Technology with a bachelor's degree in civil engineering.

A total of 845 degrees were awarded today at the 71st Commencement Exercises of the Georgia Institute of Technology in Atlantic, Ga. More than 5000 saw the award of 735 bachelor's, 102 master's and 8 doctor's of philosophy degrees by President Blake R. Van Leer.

Following the ceremonies, the graduates and their families and friends were guests of the National Georgia Tech Alumni Association at a reception and luncheon held in Brittain Dining Hall.

Because of the great demand existing for engineers, scientists, architects and industrial executives, all the graduates, except those going into the military services or continuing their studies for higher degrees, have accepted positions with average starting salaries ranging from \$370 to \$600 per month. Georgia Tech officials state that these are the highest salaries received by any graduating class in the history of the school.
