Farmers Are Invited To Free Chicken Dinners

Every farmer in Pennsylvania was invited today to a free Farm Bureau chicken dinner in Harrisburg August 4.

H. S. Agster, executive vice president and general manager of the Pennsylvania Farm Bureau Cooperative Association, extended the invitation on behalf of his organization and all affiliated Farm Bureau outlets in the state.

The chicken dinner, Agster explained, is one feature of a gala all day Farm Bureau Roundup which will be held in the State Farm Show Building in uptown Harrisburg.

The affair will be the fourth and climactic farmer event in the celebration of 20 years of Farm Bureau service in Pennsylvania, he added.

Two of Pennsylvania's top farm leaders will be guest speakers at the Roundup, Agster said. They are Dr. Milton S. Eisenhower, president of Pennsylvania State University, and the Hon. Miles Horst, state agriculture secretary.

Illustrative displays contrasting farm production methods of 1934 with those of today will be used to depict some of the progress made in the last two decades by Pennsylvania farmers, Agster added.

"Many of the economic and social gains in the past 20 years by farmers in this state are a direct result of their own mutual self-help program," he explained.

"We hope at this Farm Bureau Roundup to review some of these gains for the purpose of helping to chart our course thru at least part of the next twenty years," Agster added.

Tickets for the chicken dinner can be obtained free of charge at any of the 32 local Farm Bureau Cooperative Associations or the 20 Farm Bureau Service Agencies scattered throughout Pennsylvania.

Special musical entertainment will be presented at the Roundup by the Reinsmith-Kulowitsch Orchestra, of Allentown.

Another phase of the Farm Bureau 20th anniversary celebration is the patron tour program which will continue into October.

This program is designed to acquaint Farm Bureau patrons with the facilities Pennsylvania farmers now own as a result of 20 years of cooperative enterprise, Agster said.

In line with this program, the farmers are visiting the Farm Bureau mills and warehouses which are a result of their cooperative enterprise.

Trials of Annual Flowers Attract Tourists



Every summer thousands of visitors stop to see the Test Flower Gardens at The Pennsylvania State University Agricultural Experiment Station. These trial grounds will be ablaze with color this year with more than 1,000 samples of annuals planted. The flowers usually are at their best in August but continue to be brilliant until frost.

FIRM, FLEXIBLE SHOES ADVISED FOR CHILDREN

Shoes for toddlers, preschool, and school children should have firm but flexible soles. Margery L. Bessom, extension clothing specialist, at the Penna. State University, points out that the sole of a good shoe will bend at its widest part. Leather soles are generally better than rubber or plastic soles which are too warm.

Look for firm but pliable tops on shoes. Oxfords are a good shoe for general wear for the school-age child. Four to six eyelets are advised.

Canvas shoes do not give much support and are hot. They are a shoe to wear a short time, such as for athletics and beach wear.
