To Farmers

Twenty years of progress in
 Pennsylvania agriculture will
 be the theme of the statewide
 "Farmers' Roundup" to be held
 August 4 in the State Farm
 Show Building, Harrisburg.
 Thousands of farmers from
 throughout the state will attend
 to celebrate 20 years of Farm
 Bureau service to Pennsylvania
 agriculture.

Sponsored by the Pennsylv-
 ania Farm Bureau Cooper-
 ative Association, Harrisburg,
 the event will feature a chicken
 barbecue, in which tons of ten-
 der young broilers will be bar-
 becued and served to thousands
 of farmers and their families.
 More than 70,000 farmers own
 and control the statewide co-
 operative for purchase of their
 farm supplies.

Because farmers are hearty
 eaters, a half chicken will be
 served to each ticket holder.
 The tickets are free but must be
 obtained at one of the nearly 90
 Farm Bureau outlets in the
 state. The barbecue pits, to be
 specially built near the Farm
 Show Building for the event,
