Medical Research Society Seeks Public Support

Dr. Roth said certain groups were "seeking to hamstring scientists by trying to prevent the use of animals in experiments by raising the false and misleading issues of cruelty."

"Our scientists are not only dedicated to the saving of human lives, but to the humane treatment of animals as well. They have saved countless lives of animals as well as humans through the discovery of treatment and cures for animal ills through their experiments. Some of the most important medical advances that have been made in the last 50 years are as a result of medical research involving the use of animals."
