

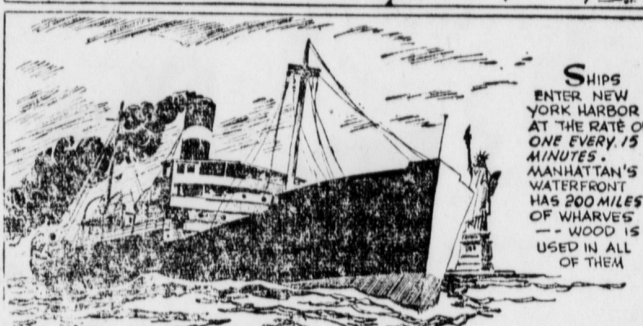

Increased interest shown by youngsters in guns and hunting brings out the necessity for firearms education. Records show the incidence of gunfire casualties among youngsters decreases to practically zero among those taught safe shooting procedures prior to their first hunting trip. The prospect is, however, that many youthful nimrods will go out for wild game this fall unaccompanied and without previous gun safety training.

It is encouraging to note that the number of men who take their own boy or the son of a neighbor on hunting trips increases each year. At the end of the day the adult's game bag may not be so full as if he had accompanied a shooting crony, but by relieving the excitement of his own early hunting experiences through those of his pupils, and having the satisfaction of teaching safe and mannerly conduct afield, he is amply repaid.

In the past years, during September and October, many a Pennsylvania sportsman's organization has generously assumed the responsibility of teaching boys and girls safe gun handling and has provided shooting on a range under expert guidance. The basic course is sometimes followed by field trips, when safe and courteous hunting practices are taught under natural conditions. Experienced sportsmen are quite willing to lend a hand at instructing novice shooters. To have his legs torn raw and escape the Indians, or pull out of the cave, and become his enemies' captive. It was instantaneous judgment with Brady, he would take the carcass's punishment rather than enter into a shooting match with the redmen.

"He eventually killed the blood-thirsty wolverine; limping painfully, coming home, his legs bloody and infected he was never the same man afterwards. The wolverine seemed to have poisoned his whole system, and he lacked the will power to start out on fresh Indian raids. Gradually his bold nature faded and he seemed to lose his fighting spirit. In a year and a half he was dead."

"Sam Brady has been dead these many years, since Christmas Day 1795 in fact, yet his is the greatest name in the entire gamut of Pennsylvania Indian fighters."

**Capt. Sam Brady
State's Greatest
Indian Fighter**

Henry W. Shoemaker, President of the Pennsylvania Folklore Society, State Museum, today said "no history of any section of Western Pennsylvania would be complete without some mention of the deeds of Western Indian fighter of any age."

"Few men in the short span of 37 years of life," he said, passed through as many thrilling adventures or had as many narrow escapes from death as he. "Hundreds, yes thousands of Indians longed for his scalp, yet he seemed to bear a charmed life, and no warrior ever lived to claim that glory. And after a short life of the most thrilling adventures that ever befell any man, he died a peaceful death in bed. As a hunter and killer of Indians Captain Sam Brady was without a peer and had few equals, not even excepting the famous Peter Grove and Lewis Wetzel.

"The Indians held him in greater fear than any white man on the frontier, and many a raid was abandoned when the hostiles learned that Brady was on their trail.

"One morning in 1794 Captain Sam found himself tracked by an Indian and edging into a small cave, he felt he would be safe until his pursuer left the neighborhood. Unfortunately he had stepped into the den of a wolverine, one of the most savage animals, which tore at his legs, ripping through his tough leather boots with cruel effort and effect.
