## Alice Strickler Dies; Long Active In Sunday School

Miss Alice Nissley Strickler, 80, died at 8:25 a. m. Thursday at the home of her nephew and niece, Mr. and Mrs. Amos S. Newcomer, Mount Joy R1. She was born in Rapho Township, a daughter of the late Amos R. and Martha Nissley Strickler.

She was a former school teacher for many years, having taught in the Newtown, Locust Grove, and Oak Grove Schools.

Miss Strickler had been honored this week by the 92nd annual Pennsylvania Sunday School Convention held in Chambersburg. She is one of 32 men and women from the state who was honored for serving for fifty or more years in Sunday School work.

A member of the Salunga Methodist Church since 1901 she began teaching Sunday School the next year. In 1908, she became superintendent of the Sunday School and has remained in that position ever since. Although she has

had 52 years of continuous service in the Salunga Church, she was also active in Sunday School work before she joined this church. She started playing the piano and organ in Sunday School as a small child.

She is survived by one sister, Mrs. Annie C. Newcomer, Mt. Joy R1; one brother, Amos R. Strickler, Mount Joy R1; and by a number of nieces and nephews.

Funeral services will be held Monday afternoon at 1:30 at the Nissley Funeral Home and at 2:00 at the Salunga Methodist Church. Interment in the Kraybill Cemetery.

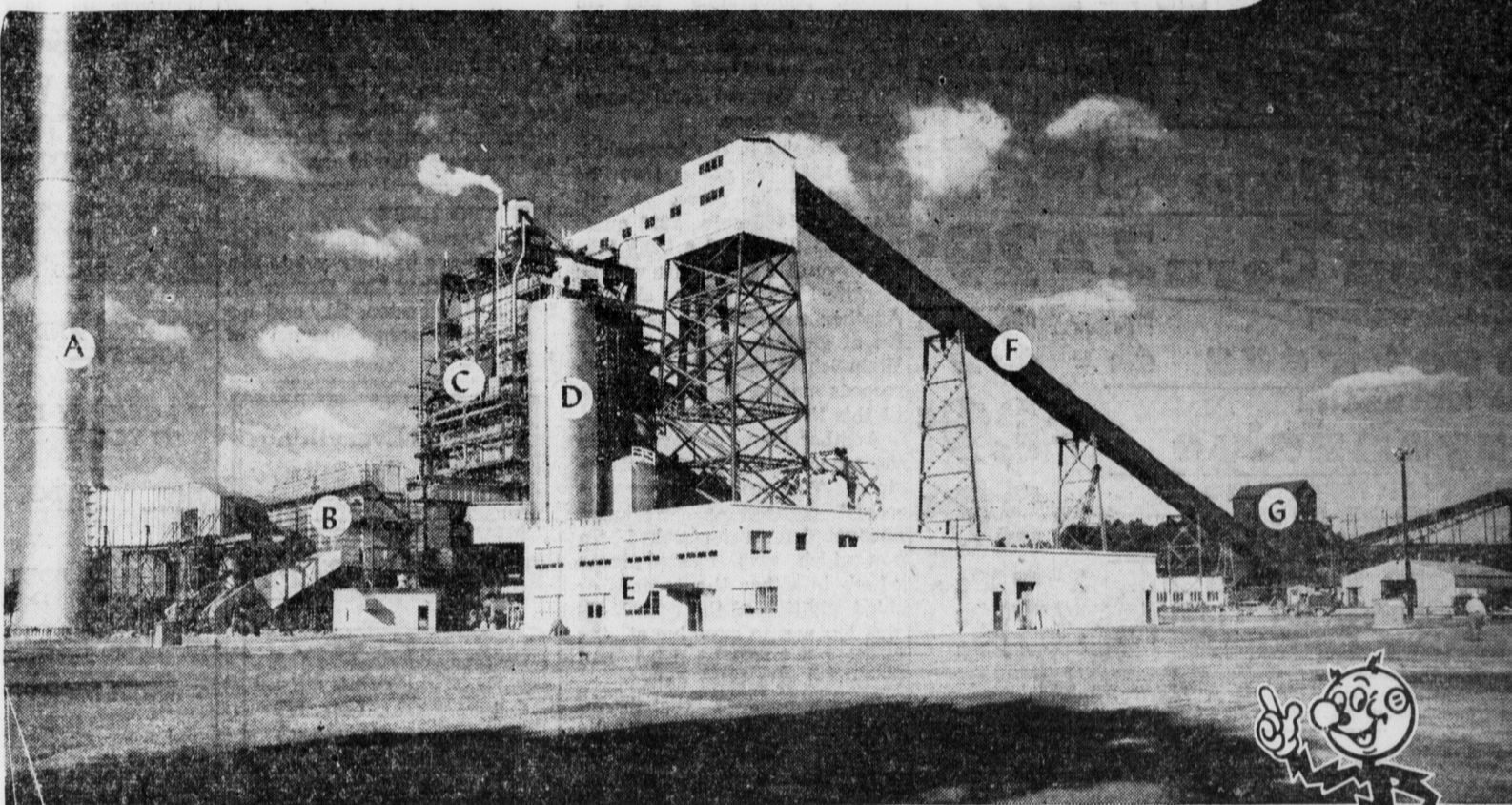
## THANK OFFERING PRESENTATION
