Henry Hackman Reports On Journey To Arizona

Henry H. Hackman, Manheim R2, and Clarence Garber, Lancaster R2, returned recently from a all-expense-paid trip to Arizona. The men who enjoyed the all-expense-paid trip to Arizona are the winners of Goodyear's seventh annual Soil Conservation Awards program, conducted in 50 competing units including every state in the country. The Winning Soil Conservation District in each state or competing unit was allowed to send one governing body member (Mr. Hackman and the top cooperating farmer or rancher (Mr. Garber) on the grand award trip. Selection of the top district in each competing unit was made by a board of impartial judges comprised of leading agriculturalists from the state concerned. We urge that every district in Pennsylvania enter the 1954-55 contest as evidence of our interest in conservation of our natural resources.

Mr. Hackman reports: We returned to Lancaster on Monday 8:22 a. m. Dec. 13, from a most wonderful trip to the Valley of the Sun in Arizona where we spent four memorable days. We left the Lancaster station at 5:35 p. m. Saturday, Dec. 4, and arrived in Phoenix on Tuesday at 7:00 a. m. To greet the one hundred heroes of America's last frontier soil conservation were a host of Goodyear executives headed by Mr. K. B. McMicken, manager of the Goodyear Farms. We were then taken to Litchfield Park in five city buses. Immediately we were assigned rooms where we found western shirts, levis, and ten gallon hats which we wore during our stay. These were gifts to us from Goodyear which became our prized possessions. The rich green colors of well-kept lawns in the park and around the Wigwam Inn was heightened by the colorful western shirts worn by the conservationists. Those from the Northwest wore toast colored shirts; Southeast, brick red; Upper Mississippi, polo green; Western Gulf of Mexico, tan; Northern Great Plains, ice blue; Southwest, rust; and Pacific, turquoise. Representatives of Goodyear's Akron headquarters were outfitted in yellow shirts and those of Goodyear Farms in royal blue.

While absorbing the sun and desert air at the Wigwam Inn, we had the opportunity to observe large scale farming and ranching operations, on the 14,000 acre Goodyear Farms and enjoyed an entertainment program that included desert and mountain tours, an open air barbecue and a wild west rodeo. The tours included direct observation of irrigation systems, conservation practices, crop cultivation, and harvesting operations on the Goodyear Farms. Famous among their practices is the "green feeding" program. The new cattle feeding techniques adds many pounds to fattening cattle by bringing a mixture of green and dry feeds direct to the stock in feeding pens rather than allowing cattle to forage in pastures.

Evening programs included addresses by Gov. Howard Pyle and other prominent Arizonians. The feeling existed among many of the guests of the Goodyear Rubber Co. that there should be some expression of the gratitude to our host. Those called on to convey our thanks were: Mr. Frank Feser, South Dakota; Mr. W. F. Hall, Georgia and Mr. Henry Hackman, Pennsylvania. Mr. Hackman was the spokesman for the states north of the Mason and Dixon line and East of the Mississippi to the Atlantic Ocean. Their expressions of gratitude were heard during the Thursday evening dinner hour. The statement of appreciation of the Pennsylvania in behalf of the northern tier of states follows:

"From the time we left our home base, where we were greeted by Goodyear representatives, to the present moment here at the Goodyear Farms, we received hospitality that is accorded only to kings. The transportation personnel have given us every courtesy possible from the carrying of baggage to dining car service. The Goodyear people at the Wigwam Inn and the Goodyear Farms are making our visit a memorable one by entertaining us with every possible consideration. For this hospitality we are indeed

most grateful. We, the guests of the Goodyear Rubber Company, represent a great diversity of agriculture across the United States. It is equally true that we represent a great homogeneity of purpose, that of conserving these rich God-given natural resources of our country. It is in this area that we especially thank you, Mr. Settle, and the Goodyear Rubber Company for assisting us, the soil conservation district supervisors of 2500 districts, to do a better job in conservation. You and your company have given unselfishly in promoting better conservation practices which will continue to raise the standard of living of the present and future generations. Accept all our most hearty and sincere thanks for a wonderful trip to the Goodyear Farms here in Arizona."

We left the Wigwam Inn in Litchfield by bus at 3:30 p. m., Friday, boarded the train in Phoenix at 5:20, and arrived at the Lancaster Station at 8:20 a. m. Monday.

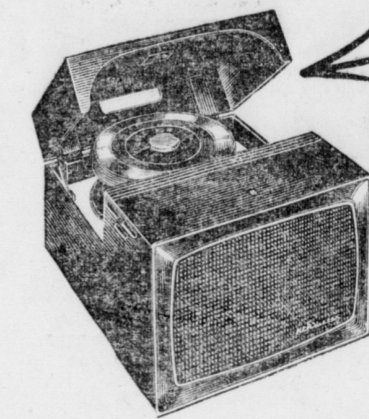

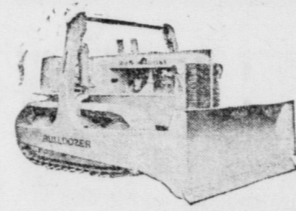
