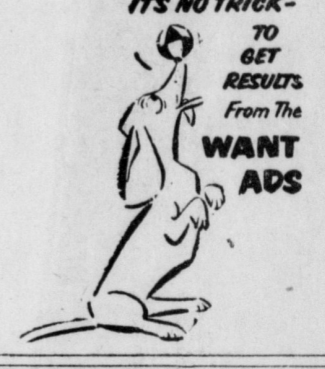

Local Committee Urges Surplus Food For China

In August the Yangtze River, with a flood crest of 97 feet, inundated an area larger than the state of Texas, in the "rice bowl" of China. Though this fourth largest river of the world has flooded for centuries, the flood crest is the highest ever recorded. Twenty-three years ago a less severe flood drowned 140,000 persons and left 10 million homeless. The famine that followed in its wake brought death by starvation to 53 million more men, women and children.

The local committee, under the weight of these little publicized facts and believe in the biblical injunction of Jesus, "Love your enemies, bless them that curse you, do good to them that hate you - - -" and the words of the Apostle Paul, "Be not overcome of evil but overcome evil with good - If thine enemy hunger, feed him", formed and have sent out material on "Surplus for China Campaign" to all the city and county churches urging participation.

The local committee includes Marshall and Helen Bush of Columbia R1, Professor Albert Gray of Elizabethtown College, The Rev. Alfred C. Bartholomew who has been active in migrant labor problems in this area and is teaching in the Theological Seminary in Lancaster, The Rev. David Dunn, The Rev. Donald M. C. Englert, The Rev. Alfred N. Sayres, all professors at the Seminary, The Rev. John M. Gordon of the First Presbyterian Church, Lancaster, Professor Paul Whitley and The Rev. Charles Spotts of the Franklin and Marshall College, Esther Whitley of Millersville State Teachers College Library, Dr. Henry N. Williams of Lancaster and The Rev. Paul E. Whitmoyer of Kessel Hill.

Public Law 480 authorizes the President of the United States to furnish food from surplus stock to needy populations "without regard to the friendliness of their government". Under this provision food was recently furnished to victims of a flood of the Danube in Hungary and East Germany.

There is in storage, according to a recent report from CARE, over 447,000,000 pounds of butter; 443,000,000 pounds of cheese; 329,000,000 bushels of corn; 753,000,000 bushels of wheat; 689,000,000 pounds of refined cotton seed oil; 223,000,000 pounds of dried milk; 100,000,000 pounds of edible beans - all these plus millions more pounds, bushels and hundredweight of 21 other agricultural products. The valuation of them is estimated at nearly 4 billion dollars. It costs the American taxpayer between one-half and three-quarters of a million dollars a day just for storage. Through Share Our Surplus Campaign of the Church World Service some funds for transportation to the starving millions in China are already available but up to the present the State Department has refused to allow any funds or food to go to China.

The committee hopes that through an aroused public opinion of Christian people this government will be encouraged to offer the Chinese people thru their government a portion of our surplus for this emergency. It is hoped that there will be no strings attached to this offer but that it will be a free will offering at this season to those in distress. The committee points to the inevitable reaction of a starving man to the sight of bins of surplus food across the water and believe that if America can meet this opportunity quickly and without political implications some of our lost prestige in the Orient may be reclaimed and the pressure of cold war lessened.

The Massachusetts Council of Churches has given unanimous approval of the "Surplus Food for China Campaign" and the local United Churches of Lancaster City and County has it under consideration.
