1391 ADMITTED TO LANCASTER GENERAL HOSPITAL IN DECEMBER

1,391 persons were admitted to the Lancaster General Hospital during December, it was announced by Dr. D. C. Smelzer, executive director of the hospital, at a meeting of the board of directors on Monday, January 10, 1955.

The admitted persons required 10,972 days of hospital service. Other census figures include:

Patients discharged during the month, 1396; number of operations 613; number of births, 283; 834 patients were treated in the receiving ward; 381 patients were treated in the dispensary with 516 visits.

The average number of patients per day was 354. The highest number of patients for one day during the month was 403 on Friday, Dec. 3, 1954.
