DR. WILLIAM M. WORKMAN
Dr. William McCullough Workman, 55 Marietta Avenue, Mount Joy, oldest practicing physician in the borough, died at 10:10 Saturday in the Lancaster General Hospital at the age of seventy. He died following a heart condition from which he had suffered for a number of years. He was admitted to the hospital last Monday.

He practiced at his Marietta address for 39 years. He was a past president of the Lancaster City and County Medical Society, member of the Pennsylvania State Medical Society; member of the American Medical Association; member of the First Presbyterian Church and was an elder there since 1922. Fire Company No. 1, Mount Joy, the Christiana Lodge 417, F & AM, member of the Troop Committee of Mount Joy Boy Scouts for over 20 years, director of the joint board of the Tuberculosis Society of Lancaster County and member of the Rotary Club. He was a company surgeon for the Pennsylvania Railroad, medical officer of the 111th Ambulance Company during World War I, was the examining physician of the Lancaster County Board No. 1 during World War II, and was a deputy coroner in the Mount Joy area for about 20 years.

He was born March 13, 1884 in Zanesville, Ohio, and graduated from York Collegiate Institute in 1901; Franklin and Marshall Academy in 1902; Franklin and Marshall College, 1907; and Jefferson Medical College in 1912. Besides his wife, the former Florence Worthington, he is survived by these children; Marian G., wife of F. J. Fries, Clayton, N. J.; William M., Jr., Stewartstown R1; James B., of Long Island, N. Y.; Adelaide, wife of John H. Dodds, II, Merion; and several grandchildren. Also surviving are a brother, Chaplain Robert D. Workman, LaJolla, California; and three sisters; Miss Isabel Workman, of Leaman Place; Helen, wife of Ralph Helm, Paradise and Miss Francis Workman, Philadelphia.

Funeral services were held Tuesday afternoon from the Nissley Funeral Home with interment in the Mount Joy Cemetery.

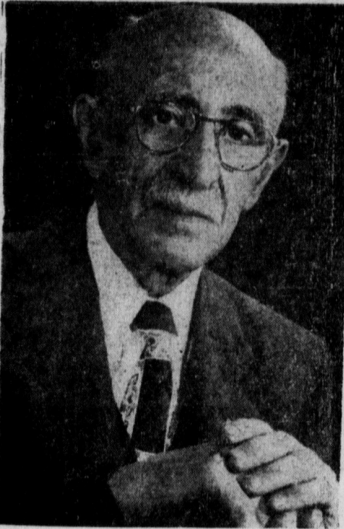
