Consolidated earnings of Pennsylvania Power & Light Company and its subsidiary, The Scranton Electric Company, accruing to the common stock of Pennsylvania Power & Light Company for the twelve months ended Feb. 28, 1955 were \$16,441,446, equivalent to \$2.89 per share of common stock outstanding at such date, as compared with \$15,265,332 or \$3.09 per share on a pro forma consolidated basis for the twelve months ended Feb. 28, 1954.

Consolidated revenues for the twelve months ended Feb. 28, 1955 were \$109,430,522, an increase of 1.8% over the revenues for the previous years.

Crispy-Top Corn Flake Souffle

2 tablespoons butter
2 tablespoons flour
2 cups milk
1 1/2 cups grated American cheese
2 1/2 eggs, separated
1 teaspoon salt
1/2 teaspoon dry mustard

Melt butter, add flour, and stir to a smooth paste. Add milk gradually; cook over low heat, stirring constantly, until thickened. Add cheese and stir until melted. Crush 2 cups of the corn flakes slightly; add to cheese sauce. Beat egg yolks with salt and mustard. Stir hot mixture gradually over the yolks. Beat egg whites until stiff and fold in cheese mixture. Turn into 2-quart casserole. Sprinkle remaining 1/2 cup corn flakes around edge or in center of casserole. Bake in a slow oven (325° F.) about 50 minutes. Yield: 6 servings.

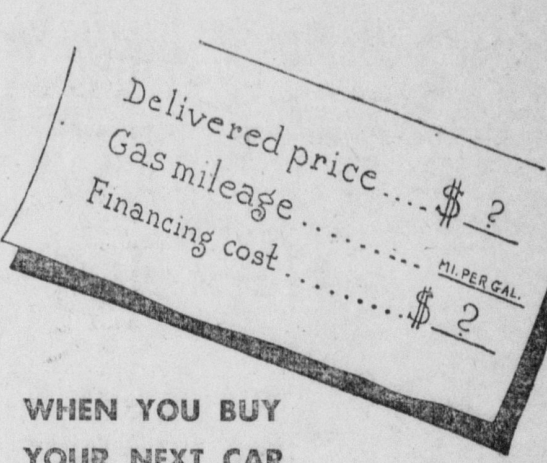
