Almost 400 Seek P.P.&L. Scholarship

Close to 400 applications have been received for six Pennsylvania Power & Light Company scholarships to be awarded this year, according to an announcement today by Chas. E. Oakes, PP&L president.

All applications are now in the hands of an independent scholarship awards committee, consisting of Nichol H. Memory, director of admissions at Stevens Institute of Technology; Kenneth H. Condit, dean-emeritus of Princeton's school of engineering; and Charles C. Tiltinghast, principal-emeritus of Horace Mann School.

Application forms and transcripts of applicants' high school and extra-curricular activities are being renewed by the committee. When College Entrance Examinations Board test results are received, evaluated and coordinated with other information, the winners will be announced. Selection of winners will be solely in the hands of the scholarship awards committee.

As in last year's program, Mr. Oakes revealed, a sizeable number of high schools as well as many students of exceptional ability are represented among the applicants. The PP&L president called this "evidence of the good job secondary school officials are continuing to do in providing a higher standard of educational instruction as well as in encouraging Central Eastern Pennsylvania young people to make every effort to continue their education "at higher levels".

A statistical breakdown revealed that 44 were from P. P. & L's Lancaster division. Applicants were received from students enrolled in high schools in Lancaster, Lititz, Columbia, New Holland, Bowmansville, Elizabethtown, Ephrata, Gap, Honey Brook, Kinser, Millersville, Pequea, Refton, Reinholds, Shillington, Sinking Springs, Soudersburg, Terre Hill, West Lawn, Wrightsville and Wyoming Hills.

The PP&L program, Mr. Oakes pointed out, is designed to offer assistance to both young men and women as well as to encourage them to make a free choice of the course of study they wish to pursue.

One out of every three applicants is a girl. Selection of intended professions show a wide range of choice. About 43 per cent of applicants have indicated careers in the technical field ranging from engineering and chemistry to industrial research and nuclear physics. Teaching, the next most popular field, was chosen by 13 per cent or almost twice the number that indicated this profession last year. A little over 12 per cent specified careers in the medical profession while 5 per cent indicated the business field. Remaining choices range from the ministry and dramatics to political science and foreign service.

Each of the 15 colleges and universities to which the PP&L plan is applicable is represented among the scholarship applicants.

New Leaflet Gives Facts On H-Bomb

No longer can any American avoid the responsibility for learning everything possible about personal and community survival.

This is the key admonition in an illustrated leaflet just published by the Federal Civil Defense Administration, entitled "Facts About the H-Bomb."

One million of the leaflets, designed to tell Americans how they can survive a superbomb attack and the accompanying peril of radioactive fall-out, are being distributed throughout the country through regional, State and local civil defense agencies, schools, churches, industries, national organizations and other channels.

"The H-bomb," the leaflet points out, "is bigger than the A-bomb—but is still a bomb. It has its limits, as does any other weapon. It makes the civil defense problem larger, but not different."
