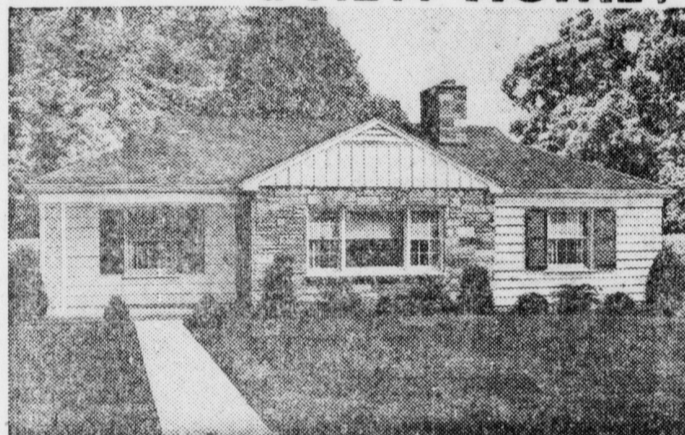

Penna. Game Commission Weekly Letter

The 2198 deer hides collected by Game Commission personnel last fall and winter and sold to the highest bidder netted the Game Fund \$2714.75.

The hides were from deer killed illegally in the 1954 season, others that died after colliding with highway vehicles and a number turned over to game protectors by hunters.

Wildlife Projects At Your Door
Many sportsmen's organizations seek opportunities to help preserve and increase wild game in their vicinity. Most of them have awakened to the fact no all-inclusive conservation plan will materialize to guide them in each instance. As more information on simple, effective projects reaches them from conservation agencies these clubs and other organizations make surveys of near-home game habitat conditions, seeking opportunities to improve them.

Clubs and individuals have assisted farmers and state agencies in tree and shrub planting, have improved streams and planted the banks, have cleaned up unsightly conditions or stopped pollution, and have completed other beneficial projects dependent on local conditions. Significantly, as matters were improved for wildlife the people and the community often profited also, esthetically or economically.

Local projects may not seem to have much value, individually, but in the aggregate many small developments produce a tremendous amount of wildlife food and cover, as well as other desired conditions. The accomplishment of these objectives also brings about improved land-owner-hunter relations, experience has shown.

Border Cuttings Provide Wild Game Necessities
One example showing the Pennsylvania Game Commission avails itself to the fullest extent of monies received through the Federal Aid in Wildlife Restoration Act, otherwise known as the Pittman-Robertson Program, is described in the following.

During the winter months, when the cultivation of food plots and much other work cannot be done by the Commission's food and cover corps, attention is given to seasonal operations of the land management program. Then the cutting of borders along woodlands, mountain roads, around food plots and other places where edge development is desirable becomes one of the main orders of business. These edge cuttings produce naturally a copious growth of good food and cover for practically all kinds of game. The most common plants that appear following such operations are: raspberries, blackberries, honeysuckle, dogwood, sumac, witch hazel, bittersweet, pokeberry, chokecherry, grapevines and viburnums of various kinds.

This year, during the short month of February alone, 72,631 linear feet of borders were cut on State Game Lands, the Allegheny National Forest and other areas excepting Farm-Game projects. These borders averaged 46 feet in width and comprised a total area of 77.3 acres. On Farm-Game projects 46,326 linear feet of woodland borders were cut with an average width of 30 feet, comprising

a total area of 31.7 acres. Summed up, these borders so vital to game ran to 118,957 linear feet, had an average width of 39 feet and comprised a total area of 109 acres.

University Conducts Wildlife Studies
The Forestry Department of The Pennsylvania State University recognizes the recreational value of forest-dwelling wildlife in setting up its management plans. From the Penn State Centennial (1855-1955) issue and other sources we learn these things about the University's wildlife management research:

Studies of forest game species are an important part of the work on the Experimental Forest. Of these, white-tailed deer research is a major project of the Forestry Department in cooperation with the Pennsylvania Cooperative Wildlife Research Unit and the Department of Zoology and Entomology. It has produced valuable basic information on the browsing habits of deer as well as the effects of cutting practices on deer food production.

Deer browse in the forest where woody plants are a major part of their diet. In a 5-year study, recently completed, definite seasonal preferences have been demonstrated. For example, red maple is a preferred food eaten heavily in winter only; sassafras on the other hand is rarely used in the winter but is a preferred food in the spring and summer.

Research on the more common forest game species is being carried out in suitable parts of the forest. Studies of population changes and life history of the ruffed grouse are yielding information on the nature of its habitat requirements.

A life history and management study of cottontail rabbits has been conducted for several years, and is continuing, on University farmland. Breeding populations, causes of mortality and hunting season checks to learn the percentage of the rabbit population harvested by the gun each season, are parts of study. The winter food habits of the cottontail and the effect of predation on this popular game animal, are also recorded.

Population studies of woodcock are made each year on the experimental forest in Stone Valley. These census figures are used by the U. S. Fish and Wildlife Service and the Pennsylvania Game Commission to aid in setting seasons for woodcock hunting. Woodcock habitat along Shaver Creek is being maintained by cutting trees for wood products and chemically treating the stumps to prevent sprouting.

Wildlife habitat improves studies in cooperation with the Pennsylvania Game Commission are carried out in strategic areas. Blight resistant chestnuts are planted in small groves for game food.

Truck Rodeo Being Planned

Harrisburg—A tri-state truck driver championship rodeo will be held in the Philadelphia area next fall. It is tentatively scheduled for Sept. 8 thru 10, and will be jointly sponsored by the Motor Truck Associations of Pennsylvania, New Jersey and Delaware. Three winners from each state will be selected to compete in the National Truck Rodeo to be held in Washington, D. C., Oct. 13 thru 16th.

The tri-state rodeo will be open to all professional truck drivers in the three states. Drivers compete in any one of three classes—a straight class, and 2 classes of tractor-trailer combinations. But to be eligible for the competition, a driver must have had no accidents in the preceding 12 months.

This is the first that a combined regional rodeo of this type has been held anywhere in the United States, and it is expected that it may well set a pattern for other regional activities of the same type.
