**Day Camp Dates Set
Girls Asked To
Check Registrations**

The Mount Joy-Florin Girl Scout Neighborhood Day Camp will be held this year three days each week the weeks of June 14 and 21. The Tuesdays, Wednesdays and Thursdays of each week constitute the six days of day camp.

Girls of the area will be receiving their Furnace Hills folders and applications thru the mail within the next day. Included in with the county camp folder will be the application for the local Day Camp. The girls are urged to carefully remove the day camp application for use in registering for the Mt. Joy-Florin Day Camp at the Cove.

Mrs. Warren Foley is the director of this year's camp. Miss Anna Mae Eby will be the assistant director; Mrs. Arthur Sprecher, business manager and Miss Elsie Lefever, site chairman. The fee for this year will be \$2.00 per girl. This initial fee will cover two cookouts per unit, a trip to the Heisey Ranch and the insurance for the camping period.

The older girls in the camp will set up a camp site similar to that which will be used by the Senior Girl Scout Round-up in Pontiac, Michigan next year. The girls will also use charcoal cookery since this is the type to be used at the round-up. Girls have not been chosen for the round-up at the present time but it is reported that 27 from Lancaster County will be sent. Girls, by June, 1956, must have reached their fourteenth birthday, completed the ninth grade, had one year of active senior Scout work and completed the five-star senior program.

Sleep-outs will be provided for all seniors and intermediates. Tents will be purchased for the camp this year by the local social welfare association. The staff for the camp will be announced in the near future.
