## P.P. & L. Shareowners Hold Annual Meet

Chas. E. Oakes, Pennsylvania Power & Light Company president, in the annual meeting of P. P. & L. shareowners in the Allentown general office, last week reviewed the utility's '54 operations and outlined prospects for 1955.

Mr. Oakes reported on the general economy of the service area, P. P. & L.'s earnings, progress in Nuclear generation of power and the company's construction program. More than 80 per cent of all outstanding shares of stock were represented at the meeting, one of the largest representations in company history.

The company's business, Mr. Oakes said, continues to reflect the sound growth which characterizes the economy of Central Eastern Pennsylvania. In this area a firm business tone continues to exist and this is reflected in revenue and earnings, which continue to be at reasonably satisfactory levels.

To meet the growing needs for electric power, PP&L president reported company facilities of all kinds are being constructed. The scheduled construction program for PP&L and its subsidiary, The Scranton Electric Company, now calls for an expenditure of \$32.6 million in 1955.

As part of the PP&L growth story Mr. Oakes reported to shareowners that progress has been made toward consummation of the merger of Pennsylvania Water & Power Company into P.P.&L. A favorable order already has been issued by one of the four regulatory bodies from which approvals must be secured. Actual merger is anticipated during the coming summer.

Merger of the Scranton Electric Company, whose stock is now more than 98 per cent owned by P.P.&L., also has progressed. Necessary hearings have been held and "if favorable orders are obtained from regulatory authorities" Mr. Oakes believed it might be possible to consummate this merger during the coming summer.

The company shareowners were also apprized of the latest developments in the application of Nuclear energy to the generation of electric power.

The utility president said he now saw economics as one of the major problems in the use of atomic energy for power generation. Widespread commercial use of electricity from atomic sources will depend on when and whether Nuclear fuel can become comparable with conventional fuels. He pointed out that pilot and experimental plants now under way will provide the knowledge from which it is hoped can come practical commercial application.

In reporting on PP&L's activities with respect to atomically generated power, Mr. Oakes said that studies were proceeding and in line with an agreement entered into with the Atomic Energy Commission, a company research group is investigating the feasibility of the construction of an atomic power plant with an initial capacity of approximately 200,000 kilowatts. He hopes that before long studies will be advanced sufficiently so that definite conclusions can be reached on its application here.

Consolidated earnings of P. P. & L. Company and its subsidiary The Scranton Electric Company, accruing to the common stock of Pennsylvania Power & Light Company for the twelve months ended Mar. 31, 1955 were \$16,659,415, equivalent to \$2.93 per share of common stock outstanding at such date, as compared with \$15,372,354, or \$3.12 per share on a pro-forma consolidated basis for the twelve months ended March 31, 1954.

Consolidated revenue for the twelve months ended Mar. 31, 1955 were \$110,020,533, an increase of 1.9 per cent over the revenues for the previous year.

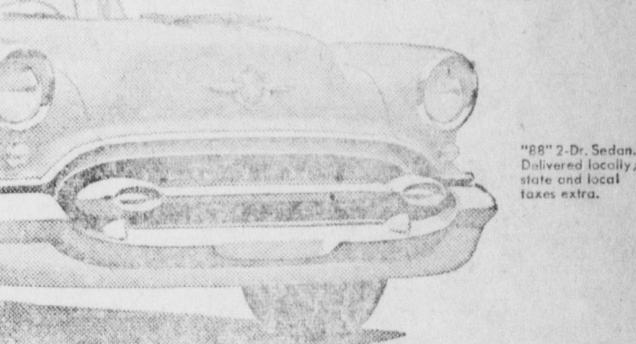

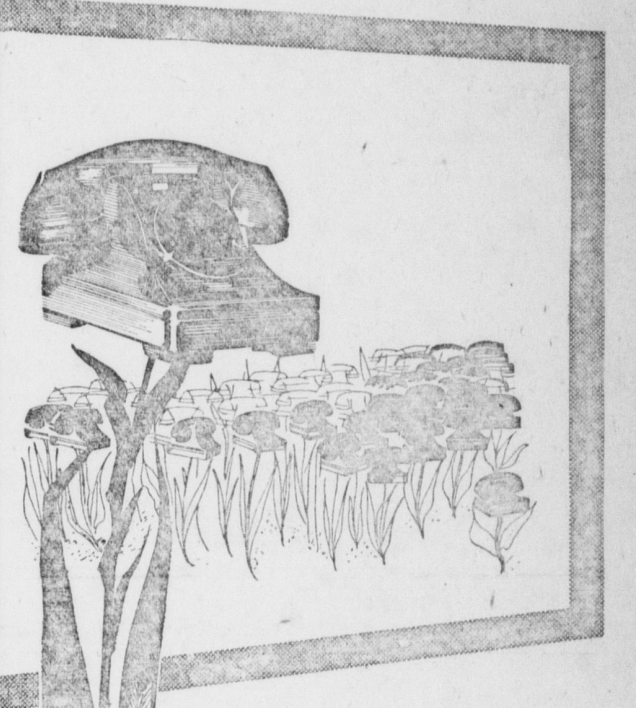
