One Mount Joy man is included in a group of forty men and one woman at John Hopkins University who have been elected to Phi Beta Kappa, national honorary scholastic fraternity according to Dr. John H. Young, secretary of the Hopkins chapter of the organization.

The local man is Clarence S. Weldon, son of Mr. and Mrs. William Weldon, New Street, Mount Joy. Mr. Weldon is a senior at John Hopkins and is a candidate for the degree of Doctor of Medicine. He graduated from Mount Joy High School in 1947 and from the University of Michigan with a Bachelor of Science degree in pre-medicine in 1951.

Following his graduation from John Hopkins in June, he expects to do his internship at the John Hopkins Hospital specializing in surgery. After his time in the armed forces is completed, he will return to the study of surgery for five additional years. At the present time, he is also doing research work at the university.

The oldest and most famous of college Greek letter societies, Phi Beta Kappa was founded at William and Mary College in 1776. Membership is now based on exceptional scholastic achievement.

Groff Re-Elected Old Timers President

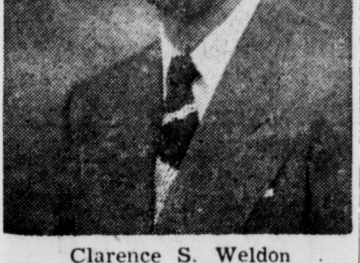

Louis P. Shannon, widely known speaker on industrial and chemical developments, will present a lecture-demonstration "Let's Look at Tomorrow" for the ladies night program of the Mount Joy Rotary Club next Tuesday, May 10, at Hostetter's. Arthur Mayer is chairman of the program which is another special program in honor of Rotary's fiftieth anniversary year. Special music for the affair will be furnished by the Dickinson College Quartet. The quartet consists of W. P. Revere, R. M. Shappell, C. A. Ferrone, R. R. Harvey and the accompanist, Charles Mayer.

Mr. Shannon will document the story of American progress by exhibiting developments resulting from scientific research and will explain how their production strengthens the national economy.

He will display some chemical developments which are so new as to be still in the experimental and evaluation stage, giving an inside view of how they were achieved, and indicating their influence of the future. An analysis of the unique factors affecting American progress will be made.

Maintaining headquarters at Wilmington, Del., Mr. Shannon is manager of the Extension Division of the DuPont Company. Traveling extensively he has addressed more than 600 groups in the last five years, appearing before universities and other educational organizations, civic groups, industrial gatherings and technical societies. His frequent meetings with these groups and his intimate association with the DuPont Company give him a unique understanding of modern industry.

Mr. Shannon has been with DuPont since 1942. Before joining the Extension Division, he was engaged in personnel training and industrial engineering work at a number of plants, including atomic energy plants DuPont built and operated for the government. He gained broad experience as an educator and as a school administrator.

Dr. Schlosser Called To Army; Leaves Sunday

Dr. David E. Schlosser, East Main Street, Mount Joy will leave Mount Joy Sunday, May 8, to report for basic training at the Brook Army Field, San Houston, Texas. Dr. Schlosser received his final notification on Wednesday morning and conducted office hours that day. Since then, the offices have been closed and will remain closed throughout his term of active duty.

He will be assigned to a station following his five weeks of training at Brook Field. Entering the Army as a Major, he will serve a minimum of two years.

Mrs. Schlosser and his daughter, Nancy, will remain in Mt. Joy at least during the basic training period.

With Dr. Schlosser's departure two MD's remain in town, Dr. Thomas O'Connor and Dr. John Gates. Tentative plans call for Dr. Newton Kendig, now serving his internship at St. Joseph's Hospital, to open an office in Mount Joy in Sept.

Dr. Schlosser was school doctor, deputy corner, organist of the St. Luke's Episcopal church, member of the Mount Joy Borough School Board, member of the Donegal School Board and member of the Rotary Club.

The sale of the Mount Joy Welfare Building originally scheduled to be sold next Friday night, May 13, will be sold tentatively the week of May 16.

No Objectors Are Present At Meeting

No one was present at local borough council meeting on Monday, except the six council members, Burgess, chief of police and reporter to hear motions passed to install approximately fifty-five additional parking meters in the borough.

In a motion made by Councilman James Spangler and seconded by councilman William Dommell, the body decided unanimously to remove approximately fourteen meters from East Main Street east of Schofield's Barber Shop on both sides. These plus additional meters to be received from the Miller Meter Company will be placed on Delta Street; both sides of North Market from Appletree Alley to Main and both sides of South Market from Henry to Main; North Barbara from Appletree Alley to Main on one side and South Barbara from Sassafras Alley to Main on the other side. This will involve thirty-six meters.

A defeated motion made by Councilman George Groff called for parking meters on the south side of Marietta Avenue from Main Street to the railroad bridge with no parking on the north side with the exception of a loading zone at the entrance to the Booth Department Store. Seconded by James Spangler, the motion came to a tie vote with Dommell also voting in favor of the motion. With Maurice Bailey, Lester Hostetter and Lloyd Myers opposing he motion, Burgess Titus Rott, forced to vote on a tie vote, voted "No". After the motion was declared defeated, Mr. Dommell made a motion that both sides of Marietta Avenue be supplied with meters. This motion, seconded by Mr. Spangler, passed with a unanimous vote. One situation will be investigated, however. On the south side of the street where one large tree extends into the street, tentative plans call for no parking at the tree thereby creating better means for two way traffic during congested periods.

Reasons Listed Included in the discussion of the meter situation, the fact was made known that the millage in the borough has not been raised for the past ten years. The borough has been (Turn to page 2)
