Columbia Marine Corps Boost 138 Active Duty Years

Columbia, Pa.—To acquaint the people of this area with their local Marine Corps Reserve, Captain Norman Rubin, inspector-instructor of the Marine Corps Reserve Unit, Columbia, announced that the combined service time of the members of his staff which includes two officers, ten enlisted men and one Naval corpsman, who are permanently stationed at Columbia, totaled 138 years of active duty, an average of over ten years per man.

Capt. Norman Rubin further stated that this provides the Marine Corps Reserve Unit with some highly competent instructors in both general military and technical subjects.

The inspector-instructor staff of the Columbia Marine Reserve unit is composed of career Marines stationed on full time duty at the training center. Their job includes recruiting for the unit, administration work, maintenance of the building, and equipment, and also to provide trained instructors for the reserve company.

The members of the inspector-instructor staff includes 3 Master Sergeants with over 20 years of service each. Master Sergeant Edwin R. Houf has 21 years and Master Sergeant George E. Richards and Thomas D. Huckaby boast 20 years each. Capt. Norman Rubin, the inspector-instructor of the unit, has 18 years of active duty. The "baby" of the staff is Cpl. Herman E. Macklin with two years of service.

The Columbia Marine Corps Reserve Unit is located at second and Chestnut Streets, Columbia, and is composed of men from both Lancaster and York Counties. Eight members of the unit come from Hanover and despite the distance, are among the best in attendance.

The present strength of the unit is 130 officers and men. Applications for affiliating with this unit can be procured at the training center any day of the week or from your local Marine Corps recruiter. The training center is open 24 hours a day. Parents are particularly encouraged to visit the training center.

Timely Reminders from The Pennsylvania State University College of Agriculture

Homemade Toys — Toymaking is a novelty for some homemakers and adds variety to the toy collection. Do-it-yourself skills learned in toymaking help homemakers become more adept at using hammers, saws, and screw drivers for other jobs, says Marguerite L. Duvall, Penn State extension specialist in child development.

Clothes Care — Give garments good care between wearings and avoid some pressing. Brush, air, and let garments rest at least a day or two between days when they are worn. This helps keep garments in good condition and prolongs their service, suggests Margery Bessom, Penn State extension clothing specialist.

Handy Storage — To save time and energy, provide storage for supplies and equipment near the places where they are first used, suggests Sanna Black Penn State home management extension specialist. Articles in constant use are near at hand, those seldom used are farther away.

Cut of Suit — A suit of basic cut and an adaptable color will be of more use than one which is typed the minute you put it on your back. With different and suitable accessories, the suit meets the needs for various occasions, points out Mae Barton, Penn State extension clothing specialist.

Pork in Menu — By varying the flavor, pork may be served often without becoming monotonous, says Helen Denning, Penn State extension nutritionist. It may be seasoned with spices, herbs, and other condiments, with flavorful vegetable or fruits, or with tartness or sweetness.

Marine Reserve Officers Re-Assigned

Major Francis D. Rineer, U. S. M. C. R. Commander of the Lancaster-York County Marine Corps Unit, Columbia, announced the reassignment of officers within that unit.

Major Rineer stated that the re-assignment was necessitated due to the rapid expansion of the unit within the last few months. Present plans call for a company consisting of 187 officers and men.

The present organization consists of three platoons, a headquarters section and a recruit platoon. Maj. John L. Breneman of 1119 New Holland Ave., Lancaster, is the executive officer, plans and training officer and commands the headquarters section. Capt. Alphonso Kasulin of 411 2nd St., Wrightsville, is commander of the first platoon with Lt. Theodore F. Benner, Jr. of 211 E. Frederick St., Lancaster as assistant platoon commander. Capt. Jack F. Tracy of 549 W. Vine St., Lancaster, Pa., commands the second platoon and is also the assistant plans and training officer for the unit. His assistant is commissioned Warrant Officer Robert W. Draucker of 625 Wallace St., York.

Another Lancaster native, Capt. Alexander A. McIntyre, 316 Atkins Ave., Lancaster, is the third platoon commander with 1st Lt. Richard A. Puckett of 1401 E. Market St., York as assistant.

1st Lt. Joseph H. Copeland of 17 E. Main St., Mountville, is in command of the recruit platoon and is assisted by 1st Lt. John C. Bristor of 309 Abbeysville Road, Lancaster.

In launching an area-wide recruiting drive Major Rineer expressed confidence that the unit would reach its authorized strength prior to embarking for summer camp on July 16th. The Marine Reserves will spend two weeks at the famous Marine boot camp at Parris Island, S. C.

Maj. Rineer stated that interested young men are invited to visit the Marine Reserve training center on Tuesday night (drill night) or any day during the week.
