

## John Heisey Is Two Time Winner Of Road-e-o Contest

John Heisey, son of Mr. and Mrs. E. Musser Heisey, Mount Joy R2, captured the first prize in the second annual Road-e-o sponsored by the Mount Joy Junior Chamber of Commerce Saturday afternoon at the parking lot to the rear of Donegal High School. John earned a total of 418 points out of a possible 500 to defeat eleven other contestants from Mount Joy and the area around the Donegal High School.

John was the winner last year when he was a junior at the East Donegal High School. He then placed sixth in state competition in Pittsburgh. This year, he beat his own record made last year of 397 points, as a senior at the Donegal High School. He was awarded a \$25 war bond by Robert Kunkle of the Kunkle Oil Company, a sleeve-patch, and will represent Mount Joy in the state finals in Johnstown Saturday, June 11.

O. K. Snyder, Jr., local Jaycee president, will accompany John to the state finals for the weekend on a chartered bus with the other seven finalists and their chaperones from the county. (John did not use the same make car both years, and both the first place teenager and the last place contestant used the same auto in this year's contest.)

Ross Eshleman, Florin, was the second place winner. Ross earned 406 points to be awarded a cash prize by the Jaycees. Ross is a student at the Elizabethtown College. Bruce Hoffman, Waterford, Marietta, won the third prize with his 373 points. Bruce, a senior at Donegal High, was awarded a cash prize from the O. K. Snyder Insurance Agency. Last year's second place teenager earned 333 and the third place winner 374. They were Jay Mamma and Charles Mayer.

Other contestants were John Hiestand, Maytown; Jay Metzler, Mount Joy; Thomas Zimmerman, Mount Joy; Edwin Rutherford, Jr., Marietta; C. James Staley, Florin; Verby Crocker, Marietta R1; Robert Swartz, Marietta R1; William Arnold, Maytown; and Charles Groff, Mount Joy. Two withdrew from the contest following the written test.

Judges for the event were Maurice Bailey and Park Neiss, Mount Joy; Harold Hable, of Mountville; and Cpl. Phillip Gerhard, Lancaster sub-station of state police. Cars for the event were furnished by Newcomer Motors, Herr's Garage, and the Donegal High School Driver-training car.

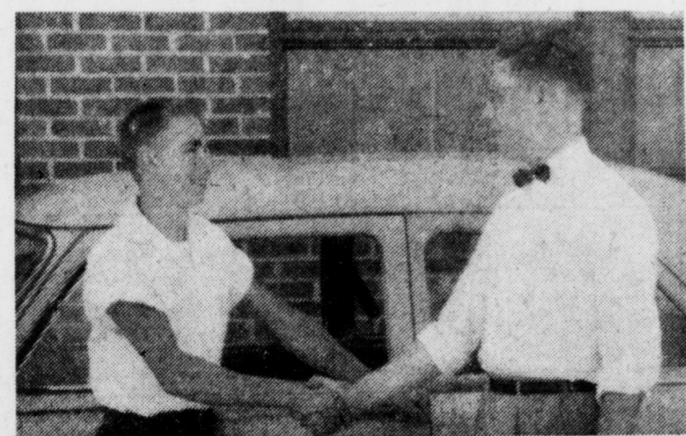
Others who accompanied the group were James Heilig, Lee Ellis and Mrs. Edward Brown.
