Small Grains Field Day At Landisville

A small grains field day has been arranged for June 13th at 1:00 P. M. at the Landisville test plots of the Pennsylvania State University, according to Floyd Innes, Secretary of the Small Grains Producers Division of the Pennsylvania Crop Improvement Association.

Clarence Bryner, University Small Grains Breeder, Dr. Raleigh, weed control specialist, and Dr. Kirby, extension plant Pathologist, will be on hand to bring you the latest information concerning the future of small grains production in Pennsylvania and a tour of the test plots will demonstrate what promising material is currently being tested for use in future recommended varieties for Pennsylvania.

Farmers, seedsmen, and millers who wish to keep well informed on all new developments in the small grains breeding and production phases of agricultural progress are cordially invited and strongly urged to avail themselves of this excellent opportunity to keep abreast of current grains research. This will be the only small grains field day to be held this summer.

The test plots are located approximately six miles northwest of Lancaster on Penna 230 at the site of the old Artificial breeding station.

P.P.&L. Grants Pay Increases, Other Benefits

Following a series of collective bargaining conferences terminated this week-end, agreement was reached between the Pennsylvania Power & Light Company and the Employees Independent Association on general salary and wage increases and various other items. The E I A, certified bargaining agent for PP&L non-supervisory employees, has been representing these employees for nearly twenty years.

Major provisions under the new agreement include a wage and salary increase, effective June 1, 1955, which begins at 5 cents per hour and moves up to 9 1/2 cents per hour for employees of higher skills.

The company will also increase its contributions toward the costs of the group life insurance program by paying, in addition to its already substantial contribution, one-third of the monthly payment presently paid by the employees.

The agreement covers some fifteen other items largely affecting equalization of working practices and procedures and other details.

The term of the newly-negotiated contract is from June 1, 1955 through June 9, 1957 with provisions for re-opening with respect to wages after May 27, 1956.

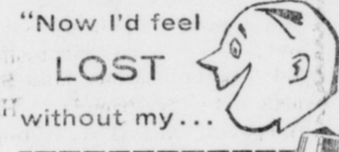
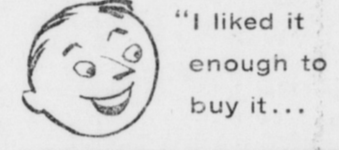
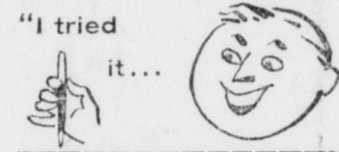
The Union officials are scheduled to submit the contract to their membership for ratification within the next several days.
