

Authority Engineer Reports Sewerage Survey To Be Completed By August

Joseph Michaels, engineer for the Mount Joy Borough Authority, announced that the sewerage survey will be completed by August. Originally scheduled for completion by July, he announced that one extra month will round out the survey which is now 80 percent complete. According to tentative plans, in both the north and the south branches of the borough there will have to be approximately eleven miles of sewers laid.

Mr. Michaels was asked several questions pertaining to the sewerage plans by borough representatives, Maurice Bailey and William Dommell. He was asked whether or not the disposal plant could be started before the sewerage system is started. He replied that it could be started this fall. Approval of plans by the state department and the formation of bond issues will enter into the starting date.

Mr. Bailey also presented the authority with a map on which were marked the previously unnamed alleys now named alphabetically by borough council. Mr. Bailey also suggested that the two groups work together on the opening and filling up of street openings in order to eliminate the closed street openings' settling causing driving problems.

Also included in Engineer Michaels' report was the fact that the survey on the water valves is nearing completion. He also received permission from the group to make a study on the advisability of abandoning the reservoir located at the Mount Joy Cemetery. He will make the report at the July meeting.

A special meeting will be called at the request of the president, Samuel Miller, to discuss the rules and regulations for water users. The group agreed to the laying of an eight inch water main on Manheim Street from Old Market to North Market Streets.

An employee will be hired by the water authority to do general repair work on the water lines. The group hopes to employ such a person within the next month. In the meantime, general repairs will be done by Mervin Smith, who works with the engineer.

Three water leaks were ordered fixed; one on West Donegal Street, Manheim and Hopewell Streets and West Main Street.

Water will be piped to the Boy Scout building and into the new Nelson Sentz building development adjacent to the Marietta pike near the Donegal High School. The next meeting of the group will be held the third Tuesday of July instead of the regular meeting night, the second Tuesday.

Bell Orders Are Being Received By Committee

Orders are being received daily for the miniature bells being cast from the metal of the old Mount Joy School bell. Several questions have arisen concerning the bells and the committee chairman sought the proper information.

The size of the bells is four and one-fourth inches in height with a diameter at the base of two and one-fourth inches.

The date of the arrival of the first shipment of bells is not known at the present time but the company has assured the committee that work has already begun. The old bell shipped via freight last week has arrived in Connecticut.

Bevin Brothers guarantee the authenticity of the bronze metal little bells as being that of the old bell.

Bevin Brothers has been in existence since 1832 and is still being run by the Bevin family, now in the fourth generation. Upon receipt of the school bell, it was placed in a locked metal compartment. As the metal is used in processing each order, the foundry personnel are required to melt down as much of the metal that is needed. The balance is kept available for later use for additional orders. The metal is kept available for visitors' inspection at any time or at any stage of the operation.
