Davy Crockett Proud Owner Of Old Pennsylvania Rifle

Harrisburg—Henry W. Shoemaker, Pennsylvania Folklore chief, today told the tale of Davy Crockett's one visit to Pennsylvania.

Elected to Congress in 1834, the new Lawmaker made a string of visits which included Baltimore, Boston, New York, and Philadelphia.

"In the Quaker City, he was first greeted by a reception committee formed by the 'Crockett' or Crockett Society, composed of Irish-born and Irish descended Crocketts who threw a magnificent party in their namesake's honor," Shoemaker said.

"Their chief gift was a bronze image to the Crockett coat-of-arms from Donegal surmounted by a Swan. The frontiersman did not understand heraldry, but remarked 'that bird is like a Trumpeter Swan.'"

"Yet the Pennsylvania Dutch or Switzers were not to be outdone with a tribute and petitioned Jacob Mylin of Lancaster County, and Grandson of Martin, the first maker of the so-called Kentucky Rifle to part with his choicest piece as a tribute to Crockett.

"The Alpine Gunsmith was just finishing his masterpiece, a replica of his Grandfather's greatest rifle, the truest shooter, his first piece, by the way, at his little stone gun shop, south of Lancaster City recently marked by the Pennsylvania Historical and Museum Com-

State Chamber Disputes Claim On Income Tax

The Pennsylvania State Chamber of Commerce today disputed claims of Leader Administration spokesmen that a stepped-up sales tax would cost wage-earners more than the Classified Income Tax advocated by Governor Leader.

"Our studies show that the opposite would be true—even if the sales tax rate is raised to 3%, with present exemptions continued," a Chamber spokesman said. "An average family with income from wages or salaries ranging anywhere from \$4,000 to \$10,000 a year would pay less under this kind of stepped-up sales tax than under the 1% classification of the income tax.

"The 3% sales tax would cost the family less even if the courts upheld the proposed \$1,000 income tax cost-of-earning deduction, which is doubtful. And, of course, if the family has income from other sources subject to tax rates rising as high as 6% under the Leader program, the heavier impact of the income tax would be even more pronounced."

Taking cognizance of recent Administration claims that a sales tax would cost taxpayers twice as much as the income tax, the Chamber said none of its findings, even for a broader-coverage sales tax, support this view.

The Chamber has prepared estimates of the relative impact of the income tax and various levels of sales taxes. It figures that a 3% sales tax, with present exemptions continued, would produce at least 378 million less than the Classified Income Tax.

If clothing and on-premise food and liquor were added to the sales tax base, the Chamber estimates a 3% tax would raise approximately \$500 million, roughly equal to the \$503 million which the Governor now says is needed. Besides the \$411 million Classified Income Tax, the Governor has recommended higher business taxes, including extension of the Corporate Net Income Tax and a boost in rate from 5% to 6%.

With broadened sales tax coverage, the Chamber's estimates show a 3% tax would cost the average family only slightly more than the 1% classification of the proposed income tax.

Here are some of the Chamber's estimates of the impact of a 3% sales tax versus the 1% "earned income" part of the Classified Income Tax on an average family consisting of a man, wife and two children:

Sales Tax, with present exemptions continued — \$26 tax for \$4,000 family (Versus \$30 or \$40 income tax); \$49 for \$7,500 family (Versus \$65 or \$75 income tax).

Sales Tax, with on-premise food and liquor added to base — \$33 for tax for \$4,000 family (Versus \$30 or \$40 income tax); \$59 for \$7,500 family (Versus \$65 or \$75 income tax).

Sales Tax, with clothing added to base — \$38 tax for \$4,000 family (Versus \$30 or \$40 income tax); \$74 for \$7,500 family (Versus \$65 or \$75 income tax).
