LEGISLATIVE ROUND-UP

Pennsylvania News Service Harrisburg — The Pennsylvania Legislature, rounding out its seventh calendar month of session - and still no further ahead fiscally-speaking than it was in January - is preparing to sweat out next week along with the weatherman in a showdown vote in the House on

the administration's proposed income tax plan.

As matters stand at the moment Democratic chiefs do not now have sufficient votes to assure passage of the tax bill, notwithstanding the fact that they control the House by a membership of 112-98. They have yet to firmly muster the 106 votes required to pass the bill in the lower chamber.

Meanwhile as the session grinds on a mass of bills are being reported in increasing quantity from committees, including nearly two score appropriation measures and several labor relations bills.

Among labor bills before the House this week are those that would regulate wage payments, require employers to pay for workers' protective devices, ban discrimination against women in rate of pay, repeal the 1947 Public Utilities Labor Arbitration Law, and extend the 1927 Arbitration Law to apply to

certain labor contracts. Quite a ruckus has been kicked up over an administration proposal to tack a graduated income tax onto the Korean Veterans Bonus bill — which would require a constitutional amendment.

Elsewhere on the legislative front a few new bills continue to be dropped into the legislative hopper including those which would:

Make available a state appropriation to match county funds for control of stem rust in wheat, oats, barley and rye;

Authorize certain cities to regulate and control the erection of barb-wire fences;

Authorize school directors in a jointure to vote at county convention meetings;

Restrict the horsepower of motorboats using Lake Pymatuning;

Abolish capital punishment in Pennsylvania and substitute a life sentence;

Provide for an assistant dog enforcement agent in each county;

Require soft coal stripping operators to furnish mine inspectors with certain maps.

Set up an appropriation for sealing, dewatering and extinguishment of fires in abandoned mines;

Increasing financial assistance to blind persons with impaired vision;

Change the name of "Arms-tice Day" to "Veterans Day."

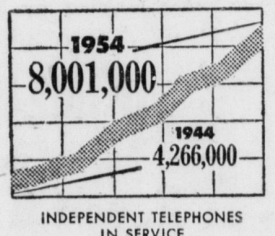
