**The Pennsylvania Story: Sales Tax Gaining Favor As Lesser Of Two Evils**

Harrisburg — The tax future now is no more resolved for Pennsylvania than it was originally when the 1955 session came into being last January. In fact if anything it is perhaps more confused.

The climatic action on the Governor's proposed income tax in the House this week provides no answer to the fiscal problems facing Pennsylvania's taxpayers.

There still remains the stumbling-block problem of finding some suitable tax program to underwrite Pennsylvania's billion-dollar-plus fiscal giant. It is doubtful if a Democratic-inspired income tax plan would ever gain sympathy from Republicans — who this year dominate the Senate, although the minority in the House.

We say it is "doubtful" because there is just the possibility that in compromise a much watered down income tax plan may be agreeable in concession form to Republican lawmakers provided there is agreement on a form of sales tax, to which Republicans in many instances are becoming quite "attached".

In this respect the whole thing is somewhat ironic, for when the sales tax was passed by Republicans in 1953 there was much to do within Republican ranks over the horrifying aspects of being blamed for levying such a tax.

In recent months however sentiment seems to have been leaning more and more in the direction of the sales tax — when viewed in the light of a choice of a lesser of two necessary evils — the sales tax or the proposed income tax.

As a result Republican strategists have become bolder and bolder (admittedly somewhat in their own amazement) in opposing the income tax and rather openly favoring the sales tax idea.

In the final analysis, what appears to be happening among Republicans here on Capitol

Hill, is a realization that they have at their disposal the means of converting what was once considered a distinct liability, into an asset.

Thus watch for the sales tax in the weeks ahead to come more and more to the fore. Republicans through their grip on the Senate are determined at this time not to let any form of income tax go through—and in the upper house they can stop any such plan cold.

However if they could force a watering down of the income tax plan so vigorously advocated by the Democratic administration — for which they can claim credit in upcoming campaigns — the compromise might end up a combination sales and income tax.

It is a possibility that cannot be ruled out and in the end may be the only answer available, but the income tax as proposed — no.

Already the current session is the second largest in the history of the state being exceeded only by that year-long fray in 1951 when Governor Fine tried to run through an income tax plan. The tax future is no brighter then then. The end is not yet in sight.

The group planned a special meeting for August 8 when a special farm show committee will be formed to plan a project for the annual Mount Joy show in October. The next regular meeting will be held August 29.

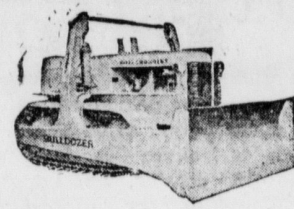
**Ambulance Answers Eight Calls**
