P. P. & L. ANNOUNCES REACTOR PROJECT

Charles E. Oakes, President of Pennsylvania Power and Light Company, today informed Adm. Lewis L. Strauss, chairman, and Gen. K. E. Fields, general manager, of the Atomic Energy Commission, of PP&L's decision to build a privately-financed electric power plant of at least 150,000 kilowatts utilizing the homogeneous type reactor, on the basis that such a plant will be commercially competitive with generating stations using conventional fuels. The in-service date for the new unit on the PP&L system is planned for 1962.

Mr. Oakes said that a contract had been entered into with Westinghouse Electric Corporation as co-developer with PP&L in the design and as for the pioneering reactor and its related electric generating equipment. The joint program will be known as the Pennsylvania Advance Reactor Project (PAR Project).

Mr. Oakes said "PP&L for sometime has been hard at work on studies, under an AEC study agreement of the potentialities of atomic energy as a heat source for electric power generation and more recently has been making studies of the various types of nuclear reactors. Our research leads us to the conclusion that the homogeneous-type reactor is economically a promising bet.

"It is one of several types on which the AEC has been working aggressively as part of its five-year program. The present problem with each type is to convert the knowledge gained about these new heat sources through research and experimentation into designs useful for full scale commercial electric power generation."

With disappointment recently expressed that no private utilities had yet announced plans for building a homogeneous-type atomic-electric plant, we believe our plan for moving ahead in this field will become highly significant and a real contribution to technological progress."

LANCASTER COUNTY STATE'S 2nd HIGHEST IN POTATO RAISING

HARRISBURG -PNS- Pennsylvania farmers are so good at raising potatoes that 11 Keystone State counties today rank among the 100 top producing counties in the United States.

Top potato county in the state is Lehigh County, followed in order by Lancaster, Erie, Northampton, York, Potter, Schuylkill, Somerset, Columbia, Cambria and Berks.

Although Pennsylvania potato acreage is not expected to be exceptionally high this year, production of up to 20 million bushels a year has been maintained steadily through improved seed and culture methods.

For example in 1950 Pennsylvania's average yield was only around 70 bushels per acre as compared with the present 240 bushels an acre.

Interestingly perhaps, among the core than 3000 counties in the United States, Lehigh County stands 18th with production of 3,500,000 bushels.

Production of potatoes in Pennsylvania has been a steadily increasing industry and it is noteworthy that a considerable volume of Pennsylvania-grown spuds are shipped out of the state each year, although generally production has been down during the past few years.
