

Mount Joy Sewer Project Showing Progress

Borough Authority Acts To Retain Fiscal Agents

Notable progress in bringing sewers to Mount Joy was evident in Tuesday night's meeting of the Borough Authority.

Engineer Joseph A. Michaels placed nearly complete plans for both the disposal plant and the sewer lines before the authority. That these plans will be completed and placed in the hands of the state in September was assured.

The Authority voted unanimously to retain C. C. Collings and Company, Inc., of Philadelphia as fiscal agents. By this action the Authority members made certain that plans for financing the project will be ready as soon as the state has approved engineering plans.

Clifford C. Collings, Jr., pointed out the necessity for starting work immediately on preliminary financial plans. Then, he pointed out it will only require a few days after state approval of the project has been received to iron out final details.

Mr. Collins presented an imposing list of municipal projects for which his company has acted as fiscal agents, including the Mount Joy water system. Authority members expressed satisfaction for their previous dealings with the Collings company.

Robert Rosser inquired of Mr. Collings as to how long it would take for his company to get their work done. Mr. Collings assured Mr. Rosser that the work would be done as soon as the engineer has completed his. Mr. Rosser asked if the Authority could have a letter covering that point and Mr. Collings replied affirmatively.

Mr. Collings also stressed the point that the Authority could award contracts as soon as it has received a firm commitment on the sale of bonds.

Report from the Allen Laboratories of Harrisburg, chemist firm that makes periodic checks of Mount Joy's water indicates that the local water is the best it has ever been.

Clearance on approval for crossing the Lumber Street bridge with a new 12-inch main is expected within the next 30 days, Mr. Michaels reported.

Plans for completion of the Cedar Lane loop in the water system will be worked out with the planning commission.

Work started Wednesday on the laying of an eight-inch main in High Street from Appletree Alley to Mount Joy Street. Valves and a new fire hydrant also are being installed for this project.

Next project will be the laying of a main to correct the dead end in Park Street. Pipes also have arrived to complete the loop on Manheim Road.
