HORSE-DRAWN VEHICLE IS TRAFFIC PROBLEM

Harrisburg - (PNS) - Few motorists will dispute the fact that today the automobile is king of the highway in Pennsylvania but the fact remains that old dobbin still has a hoof in on the very edge of the concrete at least.

And although many think of horses as almost non-existent the fact remains, according to State Police records, that some 40 persons were injured in collisions of motor vehicles with horse-drawn vehicles on Pennsylvania highways last year.

Therefore State Police Commissioner E. J. Henry this week cautioned Pennsylvania farmers to bear in mind that horses and slow moving equipment create traffic hazards on rural highways.

Motorists were also cautioned when driving on rural highways The State Police head pointed out that last year more than twice as many accidents occurred in urban areas - but 254 more lives were lost on rural roads than in town or city highway accidents.

Farmers were also cautioned to judge the speed of traffic when driving slow-moving farm equipment from lanes to the highway. No attempt should be made to drive out until the road is clear. Cars on the highway have the right of way over vehicles entering from a private drive or lane.

MILK OUTPUT UP FOR STATE

Harrisburg - (PNS) - Water supplies may have been on the decline throughout Pennsylvania during the past month but the same certainly cannot be said of the milk supply for the Keystone State.

During the past month for example output of milk was up some four per cent from a year ago, and the output of milk per cow painted almost as fancy a picture with an increase of three per cent over the corresponding month in 1954.

On Keystone State farms last month there were some 954,000 milk cows in operation that produced a record 586 million pounds of milk.

Cost-wise the average of \$3.95 per hundredweight received by Pennsylvania farmers during the month indicated a five-cent increase from a month earlier and a three-cent increase over a year ago.

Soybean meal led the general drop in feed costs and the milk-feed price ratio showed material improvement compared with a year earlier.

On the forage front, first cuttings of hay made only fair yields and some were even too poor to bother to cut. Emergency hay crops were planted in some sections to bolster winter supplies. Most hay was harvested in good condition but during early June rain damage was fairly common.

NAVY RECRUITERS AT LOCAL POST OFFICE

It was announced today by Chief Petty Officer Orborn Brown, of the Lancaster Navy Recruiting Office that he and Commissaryman First Class Bill Downs will be recruiting in this vicinity every week from 1:30 p. m. to 3 p. m. on Wednesdays. One man will be at the local Post Office during this time, Chief Brown said, and the other will be available to make personal calls at the homes of anyone interested in the Navy. Chief Brown reiterated that the Navy is still enlisting all qualified applicants, and also stated that there is no waiting period, other than as required to process applications.

Chief Brown reminds all high school graduates that there are still vacancies in the Navy's high school graduate training programs. These programs, he said, enables high school graduates to select their own job fields even before they enlist.

Job fields, such as electronics, aviation hospital and general service, include 61 different rates, such as Gunners Mate, Electrician, Radioman, Guided Missileman, and 55 other good jobs. The Chief reminds all non high school graduates that these programs are open to them too, but they must qualify during classification tests at the Naval Training Center.
