Mount Joy Animal Rated In State Production Survey

One area man's cow is included in a list of all-time State Production Leader Holsteins milked under the official Herd Improvement Registry program released by the Holstein-Friesian Association of America. With over 70,000 cows on test, the computation of these lists by states and by age groups involves the sorting and arrangement of a tremendous number of records. The calculation of these lists are possible only by the use of the punch card and automatic office machines now being used by the association.

G S Letha Belle Segis King, owned by H. M. Hess, Mt. Joy, was named second in the fifteen year-olds milked twice daily. The cow produced 16,545 lbs. milk; 568 lbs. butterfat.

Farm Show Plowing Contest Rules Are Listed

Mount Joy Community Exhibit this year will feature a new event. Rules are as follows:

1. Contestant must be a resident of Lancaster County.
 2. Contestants must be bona fide owners or employees of the owners of the outfits to be used and shall have made actual use of same on owner's farm.
 3. Contestants will be required to lay off one back furrow and complete 10 rounds of plowing. The contest shall be halted 20 minutes after one half of contestants have finished.
 4. All plowmen will be allowed one extra man for the first two rounds to check depth, help adjust plow, and to remove and replace layout stakes.
 5. Plowing must be between 6 and 8 inches deep and shall show a level bottom in each furrow.
 6. Safe operation of the equipment is essential. Any contestant guilty of flagrant violations of safe operation procedure may be disqualified by decision of the judges.
 7. Plowmen shall not be allowed to mash or drag down stubble at any time before or during the contest.
 8. Altering plowing by hand or otherwise after furrows have been turned will not be allowed.
 9. Jointers, covering wires, trash shields, etc., shall be encouraged, although such equipment shall affect the quality of except in so far as said equipment shall affect the quality of plowing.
 10. The plowing match committee reserves the right to rectify mistakes as soon as discovered and to settle all disputes. Their decision shall be final.
 11. Contestants must furnish their own fuel for their tractor and repair parts for equipment.
 12. Contestants will be required to complete the plowing of their lands following the end of the contest.
 13. Judges shall reserve the right to disbar any contestant, who in their estimation, is not worthy of plowing in the contest.

Back Furrows 25; Conformation, evenness, clean furrow walls etc. 20; Corner's and ends 15; Trash covering 10; Uniform depth 10; Uniform width 10; Safe operation 10.

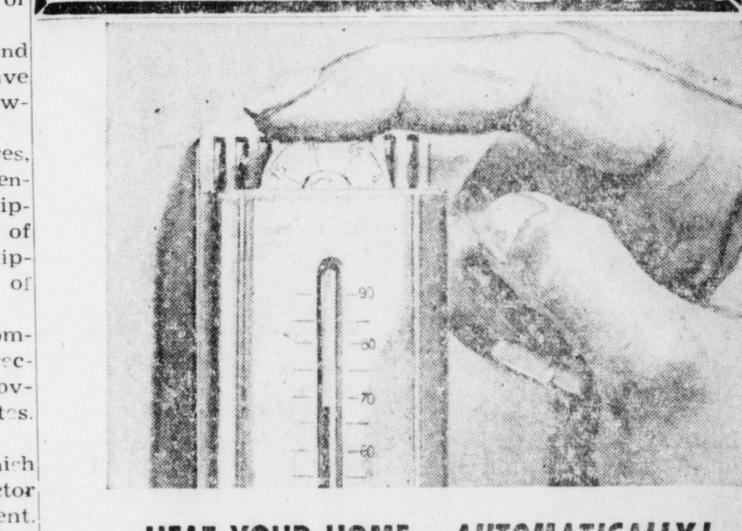
