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Two Cows Are Given Ratings

Announcement has been received from the Holstein-Friesian Association of America of the completion of an official production record by registered Holsteins cows owned by Harvey Rettew, Manheim; and M. Wenger, Rheems.

Mr. Rettew's Queen View Ormsby Minnie produced 470 pounds butterfat and 15,880 lbs. milk. She was milked twice daily for 290 days. Her average quarts daily was 24. She was 8 years, 6 months when the test was completed.

Mr. Wenger's Whbro Nora Dunloggin Lochinar produced 570 pounds butterfat and 15,989 pounds milk when she was milked twice daily for 333 days. Her average quarts daily was 23. She was 8 years, 9 months when the test was completed.

Penna. State University supervised the weighing and testing of the milk for this record and it is a part of the Herd Improvement Registry Department of the Holstein Friesian Association of America in Brattleboro, Vermont. This program is designated to give an official production record on every cow in the herd every year so that wise selection for increased efficiency can be made.

"Why Not Flood Insurance?"

The following article is reprinted from a weekly paper circulated by the Swigart Associates of Huntingdon. Permission for printing the article was received by the Wiley & Rutt Insurance Agency, East Main Street. It is of interest at this time since many persons are asking the same question to each other "Why Not Flood Insurance?"

"Every disastrous flood is followed by a public gasp of surprise that so little of the damage is covered by insurance. The explanation why insurance companies do not write general flood is simple—if they were to offer general flood coverage tomorrow at rates that home owners and industry could afford, the superintendents of insurance in practically every state would make them halt lest they bankrupt themselves and destroy the protection owed their other policyholders.

The big question on flood insurance is "How to spread the risks?" Why, it may be asked, do we have insurance against fire which over a 25 year period caused average annual damage of \$429,000,000 but virtually no insurance against flood, with an average annual damage of only \$160,000,000? The answer is simple. Just about every building, and certainly all mortgaged property, carries fire insurance. That's because fire might strike almost anywhere. With universal fire insurance, the heavy losses of relatively few policyholders are paid for by many, many prudent souls not visited by flaming destruction.

But floods wreck their havoc only in valleys, along river or on ocean shores or upon flood plains. You can't get a highland dweller to buy flood insurance. During one of the brief tests of flood insurance, it was found that even valley folk let their flood insurance lapse if no angry water engulfed them for a few years. The only persons who would be paying premiums into a flood insurance kitty would be those in imminent threat of submersion. Such a situation violates the first rule of insurance, which is that the risk cost be spread over a wide base of policyholders."

Livestock Field Day Slated Oct. 6

The Lancaster Livestock field day is scheduled for Thursday, Oct. 6th, from 10 a.m. to 3 p.m. at the Union Stock Yards at Lancaster.

This event is for all steer feeders, beef cattle breeders, and both swine feeders and breeders in the Lancaster marketing area.

Opportunity will be provided for you to study the various grades of feeder calves, yearlings, two-way cattle, and slaughter cattle. Also, hog producers will have a chance to inspect pens of fat hogs representing the revised five grades of market hogs. Through the use of signs and a portable public-address system we feel this phase of the program will be very educational.

Thomas King, Livestock Extension Specialist from Penn State will discuss the feeding and management of beef cattle and hogs for efficient production; the feeding of stillbirth and antibiotics to livestock will be covered.

William Johnstone, Agricultural Economics Extension Specialist, will be prepared to discuss the beef cattle and hog situation along with food supply outlook for the country.

Two 4-H Club Demonstrations will bring practical information to local producers; in the forenoon session the important demonstration "Reducing Livestock Shipping Losses" will be presented by Clyde Brubaker of Ephrata and Donald Rutt of Peach Bottom. In the afternoon the timely demonstration "The Meat - Type Hog" will be given by Walter Augsburger of Reinholds, and Wayne Miller of Mt. Joy. Both of these demonstrations are state-wide winners in the past two years.

This Field Day is being conducted with the cooperation of the members of the Lancaster Livestock Exchange and the Union Stock Yards Company. Please invite your friends and neighbors and attend.

New Money Order System Goes Into Effect Saturday

New postal money order forms will go into use at the Mount Joy and Florin post offices Saturday, Oct. 1. The new forms will be used in all post offices throughout the United States.

Under the new system of money orders, patrons no longer fill out an application form for the money order.

They tell the postal clerk the amount of the order and he fills in the amount on the blue money order form, then detaches a coupon which is the post office's receipt. The patron fills in the name and address of the person to receive the money order, detaches another coupon as his receipt and mails the form to whomever it is intended.

Joseph Shaeffer, of the local post office, said that the new system will save time for both the patron and the office. One important item to remember is that since there will no longer be any application on file at the office, the patron must fill in his own receipt and keep it.

HEPATITIS INCREASING HEALTH PROBLEM

Harrisburg -PNS- Pennsylvania health officials are becoming increasingly concerned over the increasing number of cases of hepatitis being reported from various counties in the state.

A spokesman for the Department of Health pointed out to Pennsylvania News Service this week that this is a relatively new public health problem in the Commonwealth.

Primary organ affected by the disease is the liver. Various forms of treatment have been tried since the first outbreaks of hepatitis among the armed forces during and immediately following World War II.

It has been noted that the most important therapeutic principles are the provisions of adequate rest and diet.

The dietary treatment considered best at the moment is a high protein, moderate fat, and high caloric diet. High protein also helps prevent fat stasis in the liver.

Present day recommendations are that fat need not be limited so strictly, provide adequate protein is eaten. It is emphasized however that fat should come from foods such as milk, cream, butter, margarine and eggs.

It was noted that the Pennsylvania Medical Journal states that "generous use of these foods is not harmful, but rather is beneficial since they make a high protein diet more palatable and afford a pleasant way to increase caloric intake!"
