PROCLAMATION BY THE  
BURGESS OF THE TOWN  
OF MOUNT JOY

WHEREAS, the President of the United States has issued a proclamation calling upon all citizens of this Nation to observe Friday, November 11, 1955 as Veterans Day to commemorate and to pay appropriate homage to the veterans of all the wars of this Nation who have contributed so much to the preservation of this Nation; to solemnly remember the sacrifices of all those who fought so valiantly on the seas, in the air, and on the foreign shores to preserve our heritage of freedom; and

WHEREAS, the Governor of Pennsylvania by proclamation has further requested all citizens of the State of Pennsylvania, to observe Friday, November 11, 1955 as Veterans Day;

NOW, THEREFORE, I, Titus Rutt, Burgess of the town of Mount Joy, Penna., do hereby call upon all citizens of Mount Joy to observe Friday, November 11, 1955, as Veterans Day. 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Cpl. Robert J. Miller, son of Mrs. Blanche Miller, is home on a 20-day leave, after completing a four-month mission in the North Arctic.

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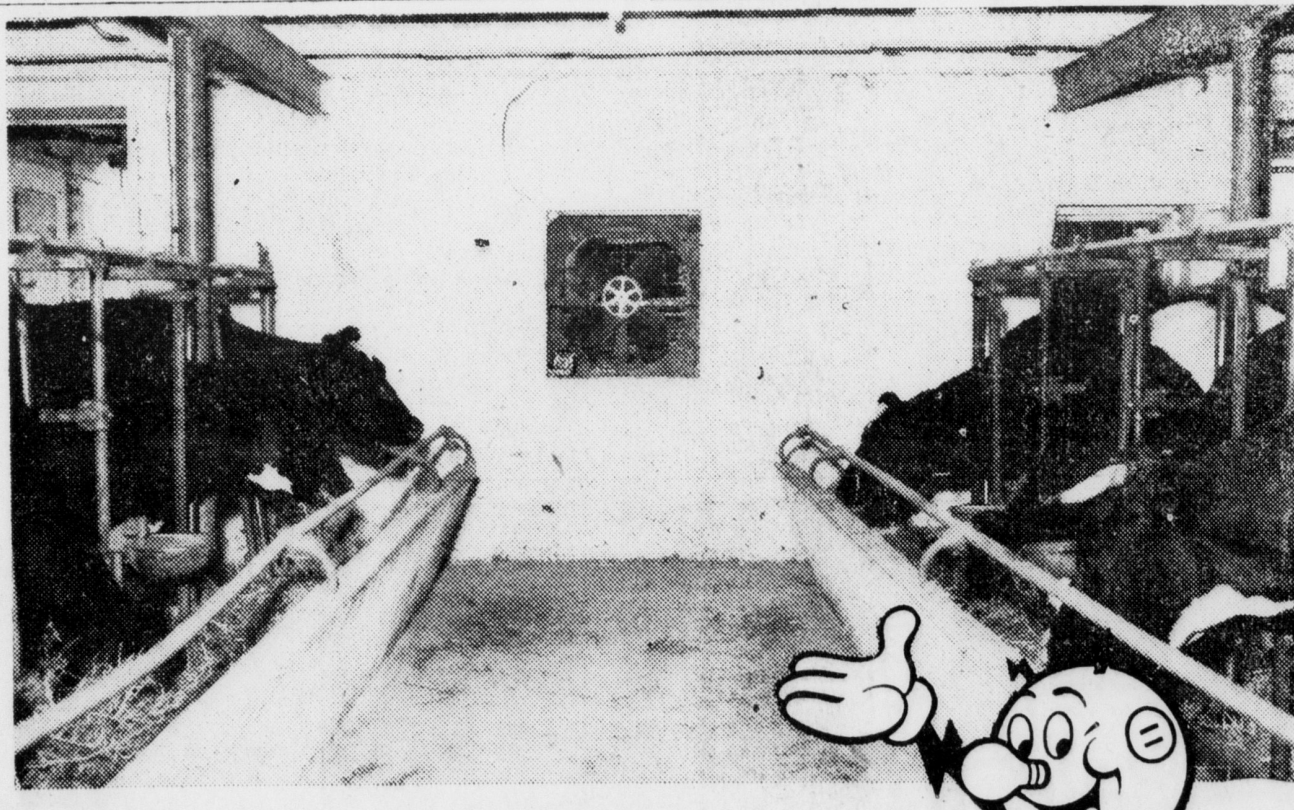
