A young man from Newtown claimed exemption from the service on the grounds of defective eyesight. He brought his wife along as evidence.

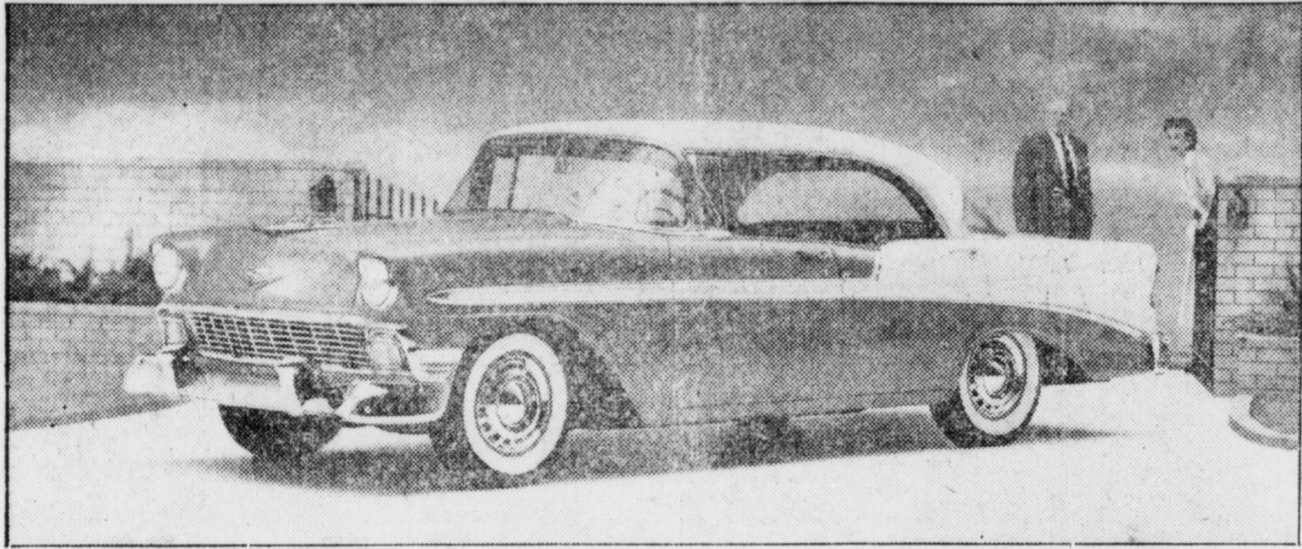

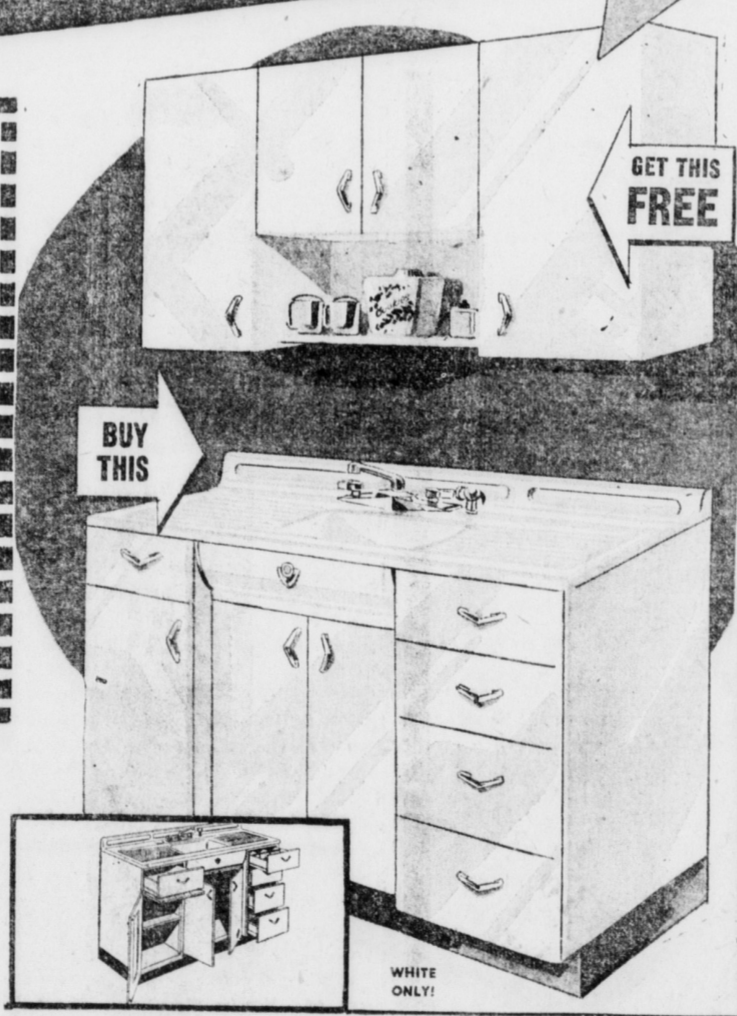
