

Sewer Project Progressing; State Reviewing Plans

Formal application for review of plans for sewer lines in Mount Joy is now in the hands of the state department of health. Engineer Joseph A. Michaels told the Borough Water Authority at its meeting Tuesday night.

Mr. Michaels said that the state department already is at work on the plans and that a conference is scheduled for Nov. 15 to discuss the proposed installation of two pumping stations and other phases of the project.

Plans for the sewage treatment plant also are near the completion stage, the engineer declared, with formal application expected to be made shortly.

"If we should get state approval in December, will we be ready to go ahead and advertise for bids?" asked Robert Rosser, authority member.

Michaels assured Mr. Rosser that everything would be ready to advertise for bids.

Work on gathering necessary assessment data also is progressing, it was reported.

SCHOOL NURSE ISSUES HEALTH REPORT

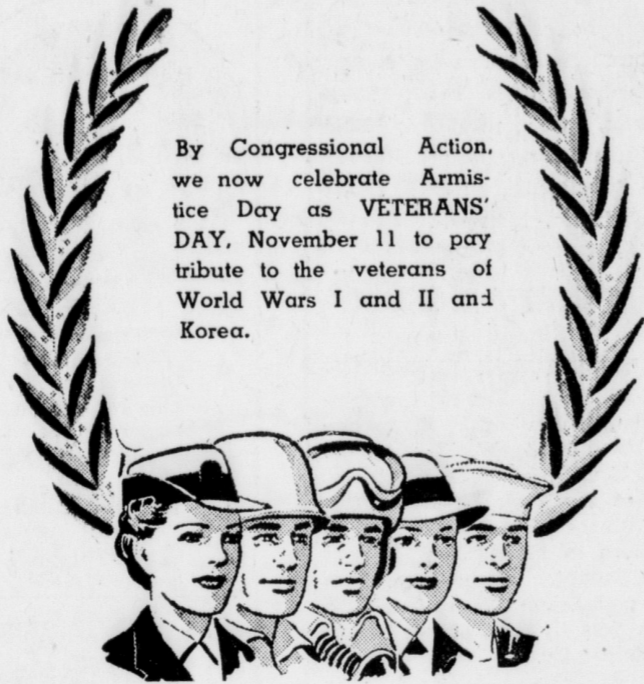
