PENNA. INDUSTRY PAYROLL NEARS \$6 BILLION MARK

Harrisburg - P.N.S. - During the past year wages and salaries and all forms of compensation paid Pennsylvania workers totaled nearly \$6 billion. Penna. News Service learned this week.
This was a slight increase from the previous year of better than \$100 million, a spokesman for the Department of Internal Affairs told Pennsylvania News Service.
Indicative of the fact that the wage per worker has increased somewhat in the disclosure that a slight drop in employment was actually recorded for the period - this in spite of increased earnings.

On the other hand capital invested in industry in the Keystone State slipped upwards by nearly a half-billion dollars to slightly better than \$7 billion. In interesting contrast perhaps is the fact that the total value of products in Pennsylvania last year was down while the value added by manufacture increased some \$100 million to gether than \$9,500,000,000.

This is the way a department spokesman summed it up:
"We should not take our industrial production for granted. Pennsylvania's industries are competing with those of other states and anything that harms our industrial production is harmful to all of us."

Farm Show, Penn State Have Same Origin

Harrisburg - Two of Pennsylvania's most outstanding institutions - the annual State Farm Show and Pennsylvania State University - actually stem from the same root.

And as preparations are readied for the 1956 edition of the Farm Show here in Harrisburg, this common starting ground is of perhaps more than passing interest.

The point of similarity in origin of the University and the Farm Show is contained in the desire of farmers of the Keystone State for the advancement of agriculture in Pennsylvania.

Both the University and the Farm Show owe their start in life to a common parent, a spokesman for the State Farm Show Commission this week told a Pennsylvania News Service reporter - the "parent" in this being the Pennsylvania State Agricultural Society, organized in 1851.

Pennsylvania then was one of the most outstanding agricultural states in the Nation. Farming was just entering the stage where farm machines were being developed and there was urgent need for the education of farmers and the application of science to agriculture.

Prior to 100 years ago farmers had little time for "book larnin'" and only a smattering of scientific knowledge existed in the growing of crops and the feeding of livestock, the Commission spokesman pointed out. Interestingly, at its first meeting in 1851, the State Agricultural Society declared it had 4 main objectives: (1) to advance education for farmers, (2) to hold annual meetings or the exchange of ideas, (3) organize county agricultural societies and county fairs, (4) sponsor a State Fair each year.

The State Farm Show evolved in 1917 from the State Fair which started in 1851 and continued for nearly half a century.

The Pennsylvania State University - now one of the most outstanding land-grant institutions in the United States - grew out of the Pennsylvania Farmer's High School which was established by an act of the State Legislature in 1885.
