Representing the figures on the twin 1955 Seals, the twins are the children of Mr. and Mrs. James S. Hutchins, York, R.D. 1. Also participating were Colonel Henry U. Shoemaker, chairman of the State Seal Sale Sponsoring Committee, retired publisher, historian and reserve officer, standing behind the children; and Dr. J. T. Millington, director of Preventive Services in the State Health Department, Governor Leader, who is Honorary Chairman of the Pennsylvania Christmas Seal Sale Sponsoring Committee, expressed the hope that "citizens everywhere will realize the importance of Christmas Seals in fighting the deadly disease, TB."

Six Clinics Held During October

The Lancaster County Society for Crippled Children and Adults, Inc., 129 E. Orange St., Lancaster, saw 20 new patients in October representing 10 different diagnoses. There were 6 clinics held with the orthopedic surgeons examining, making diagnosis and then giving recommendations for the nurse and therapists to follow. 88 patients were seen in the clinics. 1 operation was performed. 233 visits were made to the homes in the city and county by the staff of the Crippled Children Society in giving exercises to patients afflicted with cerebral palsy, poliomyelitis, muscular dystrophy, multiple sclerosis, cerebral accidents, amputees and foot disabilities. Patients who were convalescing from operations and those wearing special shoes and braces were seen as often as necessary. 111 visits were made to the Treatment Center, or a total of 344 visits.

The Corrective Swimming Class opened in October at the YMCA with 7 children registered. Mrs. Elva Shertzer is in charge assisted by Mrs. Constance Reilly, physical therapist of the staff. The class meets each Friday from 3 to 4 p. m. 14 children are registered at the Pre-school Cerebral Palsy Center which meets Monday through Friday at the George Ross School at N. Queen & Ross Sts. Volunteers gave approximately 94 hours of service by driving and assisting the kindergarten teacher and therapists at the Center. Mrs. John L. Hartman, Jr. has charge of the volunteer drivers and Mrs. William Poorbaugh has charge of the volunteers who assist at the Center.

On October 21st, the Easter Seal volunteers again started on their busy schedule. Mrs. William C. Johnstone, Jr. has been contacting interested persons for volunteer service in this project. Mrs. Titus Brubaker has met with several groups in the Society office explaining and outlining the work. The group is now checking and compiling a mailing list. Some of this work is done in the homes of the volunteers as well as in the Society office, 129 E. Orange St., Lancaster. 33 1/2 hrs. were given this month.

The Society was host to numerous organizations who, thru the Community Chest, arranged to see the therapists and patients in their daily routine of exercises.
